ABPS Philatelic Congress of Great Britain 2017

All those attending enjoyed the 2017 Congress held at the Jurys Inn, Cardiff between 27th and 30th July. We started off on Thursday afternoon with a fine display entitled *Cardiff Postal Services* by **Ray Simpson FRPSL**. This included several rare pre-stamp items. It was followed by a presentation by members of the South Wales Postcard Club. **Jon Aitchison** then showed a short film (with acknowledgement to the British Library) which included fascinating clips of Philatelic Congresses during the years 1935 – 1940. There was a drinks reception in the early evening sponsored by **Barry Horne** of Stamp Insurance Services. Following an enjoyable buffet meal, there was a '4 sheets to tell a story' competition in which 20 delegates participated and everyone voted. **Yvonne Wheatley**'s entry was the winner.

Friday's proceedings began with standing displays on *Monmouthshire* by

members of the Newport and Gwent Philatelic Societies -John Perry, Roy Bentley and Martvn Britton. It was a privilege for members attending to receive a visit from the Lord Mayor of Cardiff who officially opened Congress. The first presentation of the day was by Dane Garrod FRPSL entitled EDWINSFORD - A Carmarthenshire social and postal history. This was the story of the Drummond family and included some rare photographs and early correspondence. Graham

Winters FRPSL then delivered the Kay Goodman lecture. His topic was *The Future of ABPS*. He had several thought provoking ideas for the future. At the AGM of the ABPS, **Graham** was elected as the new Chairman. We look forward to him progressing these thoughts in the next four years. **Rufus Barnes** was confirmed as Vice Chairman.

Friday afternoon was for the Congress Medal and RDP Ceremony in the fine Council Chamber of the City Hall in Cardiff. The retiring Chairman of ABPS John Baron FRPSL received the 2017 Congress Medal. This was followed by the signing of the Roll by three of the four new RDPs – **Alan Holyoake FRPSL**, **Colin Tabeart FRPSL** and **John Hotchner**.

In the evening there was a drinks reception, kindly sponsored by Stanley Gibbons Ltd. This was followed by a superb banquet during which we were entertained by a magnificent Welsh Choir. On Saturday morning there was a standing display on the Postal History of Pembrokeshire by Gerald Marriner **FRPSL**. The first presentation of the day was by the new Congress Medallist, John Baron FRPSL. His subject was The Union Bank of Scotland. This was followed by presentations from the three RDPs - Alan Holyoake English Postal History prior to the Bishop Mark, Colin Tabeart FRPSL via Torres Strait and John Hotchner U.S.

Postal Counterfeits ~ a cautionary tale. Before lunch, there were short displays by members of the Philatelic Congress Committee: **John Perry** Finland – Postal Services during WWII; **Steven Harrison** GB Express Mail; **Rufus Barnes** Abu Dhabi; **Graham Winters** Ceylon – QV postal stationery and **Jon Aitchison** Getting to the Bottom of Things.

Saturday afternoon was free for the delegates to explore the local attractions of Cardiff.

John Sussex FRPSL began Sunday's presentations with a display on the postal history of *Welsh Regionals*. Erene Grieve followed with *Writing, Paper and Implements*, including unusual stamp boxes. Erene concluded her presentation informing us about her visits to schools where she introduces Stamp Collecting to Children. Finally, members of local South Wales Philatelic Societies entertained us to ten interesting short displays by Nigel McGaw *WWI – POW Internment Camps*, Philip Marsden *Bridges of Wales*, Reg Lyon *Lyon Postal History*, Jan Kramer Catapult Mail, Alistair MacKinnon *HMS Endurance* 1968 – 1991, Neil Jones New Zealand – 1920 Victory Stamp Issues, Chris Griffiths GB Overprints, Paul Clarke South Africa at War – 1939 to 1945, Brian Brandon St Helena and Les Ashton-Smith Leonardo Da Vinci.

This was a very enjoyable and friendly Congress which included several first-timers. Congress 2018 will be held during the last weekend of July in Gateshead. We look forward to seeing YOU there. *Gerald Marriner FRPSL*

A Letter from the Future

I was introduced to Runnymede Junior School when my two Grandchildren enrolled there in 2014. As a support volunteer I sat in on a talk given to year 3 by Erene Grieve. She captivated the children with a brief history of stamps then showed them the variety of subjects and how they could be collected and displayed in an album. Best of all was the selection of free stamps, which were given to the children in the class.

I knew little about stamps before that date, never having collected them as a child. However I did feel that the enthusiasm shown by the kids on the day should not go to waste. Previously the school had had a thriving stamp Club. The previous governor who ran it retired and there was no one left to take it over. As a result, I volunteered my time on a Monday and Thursday lunchtime to set up a new Stamp Collectors Club. We enrolled three members of the previous club from years 5 and 6 to act as mentors and 10 children from year 3.

With support from Stamp Active and some resources left over from the old Club we began a simple imaginary journey around the world. Children had to find stamps showing forms of transport, locations and animals that would be found on this imaginary trip. Their response had me hooked! Not only that but their friends from other years got to hear about it and we soon got extra members and we now have 25 children who turn up regularly. They each have an album, bought by a relative or supplied by me from funds allocated by the school (sourced by very supportive dealers at the local stamp fairs). We have had two school trips to the main Stamp Fair held each year at the Liverpool Liner Hotel. The generosity and support given to the children by the various dealers and stallholders has kept the momentum of interest amongst the children.

We gained some publicity in a couple of Stamp magazines and via twitter which attracted support from both the Isle of Man Postal service (who donated stamps and Aardmann Animation Stamp Postcards to the children). We also have had regular support form a Mr Brian Stanmore who had read the article and now sends me envelopes filled with stamps from around the world to give to the children.

I have filled three shoeboxes with envelopes sorted, alphabetically by country, subject matter, theme e.g. transport, sport, famous people, flowers, birds etc. The children take some home and keep what they want, returning the envelope to its correct position so as to keep things in order.

I too began to keep an album, concentrating on UK stamps from Victoria through to 2016. This has now grown to 4 volumes with all the swaps laid out in stock books so the children can fill in the gaps in their own collections.

Being retired, I do have time on my hands. The Club has given me a purpose and a hobby I can develop at leisure. What I didn't bargain for was the affection and respect shown by the children or the fellowship of the school staff and the various dealers I have met through the internet and at the fairs. It has kept my mind active (thinking of new competitions and activities to vary the routine) and I

now have a library of books. These help me to answer the numerous questions about history, rarity, value etc of stamps.

I would recommend anyone to get involved in starting a Club such as Runnymede's. The support from Stamp Active and the enthusiasm that has developed in the children, reinforces the lessons in school and widens their education outside the curriculum. The best of all, it taps into their natural tendency to collect things and no doubt will give them a hobby they can take away with them when they move to senior school. That is a reward in itself.

Disposal of ABPS Exhibition frames

The ABPS is disposing of its old exhibition frames and welcomes interest from all Federations and affiliated Philatelic Societies and Clubs to take some of these frames, free of charge.

Most of you will have seen the frames at Stampex, Midpex or at many other major philatelic events in this country. Each frame can be double or single sided and each face carries 16 sheets in a 4 by 4 configuration.

The frames are currently stored at the Business Design Centre in Islington and the Society or Club **shall provide staff (at least two fit people) and transport** to move and carry the frames from this location. Neither the BDC nor the ABPS has the resources to move the frames. Any subsequent maintenance, modification, storage, transport, erection, disposal and insurance costs will be the responsibility of the Philatelic Society or Club.

Frames which are already loaned out to Federations, Clubs or Societies will become the property of these Federations, Clubs or Societies, under the same terms as shown above.

If you are interested in having some of these frames please contact the ABPS Membership Secretary by Friday 29th September 2017 to register an interest. Arrangements for picking up the frames will need to be coordinated with a number of people so please do not arrive to pick up the frames without an appointment. Further, because the BDC is a very busy place and due to parking restrictions agreed timescales will not be flexible. At the moment the plan is to scrap any unwanted or unclaimed frames at the end of the year.

Bristol Philatelic Society – 120



Edinburgh Philatelic Society - 90



EPS was formed on 5th May 1927 with 10 members, currently we have 82. Unfortunately no original

members survive. Our longest serving member joined us in 1964. We still have 9 members who joined between our 40th & 50th anniversaries and 3 who joined at "77". **James C Haggart**, immediate past secretary, celebrates 50

years with the society this year. Our Golden Jubilee "Edinburgh 77" was a three-day Exhibition and Trade Fair in the Assembly Rooms on George Street, in the city centre and a dinner with 131 attendees (131 was Edinburgh's original post code and adopted as the Society emblem). Our President **David C Mekie**, was very much involved in "77" and also president for the 75th anniversary in 2002. We also hosted the Association of Scottish Philatelic Societies (ASPS) Congress in 1966, 1977 and 2002. Though there was no major event held for our 90th year, **Mohamed Nidham Al Bulushi** created a 90th Anniversary cover (limited edition of 90) which went on sale at the "77" presentation and at our AGM. It was also available at Scottish Congress a few days later. Sales of these and surplus 50th & 75th anniversary memorabilia will go into the centennial fund "Towards 2027".

Crewe & District Philatelic Society - 80

On 8th October we will be holding a dinner to celebrate our 80th Anniversary. Over the years, we have met in various locations, moving from a small meeting place to larger premises as the society grew. Today we meet in St. Peter's Church Hall, which is comfortable but not very good for parking. We hold the usual types of meetings: Members' displays, competitions, auctions, visiting speakers etc. We also play our part in the NW Federation when our members give displays at other societies. Three mid-day meetings are also held in the summer months.

The Belgian Philatelic Study Circle - 70

Formed in 1947 as the Belgian Specialists Study Circle, we celebrate our 70th Anniversary this year. Initially membership was by invitation amongst well known philatelists with a shared interest in Belgium. They met to undertake research, exchange information and record the results in the English language. Over the years membership has liberalised and expanded and is now worldwide though particularly strong in Belgium. We now cater for collectors at all levels, be they interested in stamps, postal history or cinderellas. Belgium is well endowed with all of these being a country that offers a wide variety of collecting and studying opportunities in what people see as a rather small, possibly insignificant, nation. Over the years we have amassed what is surely the most comprehensive library on the subject, with items in English, French or Dutch. We also continue to meet the aim of preserving the information researched and incorporated in our members' collections in a permanent record for future generations through our quarterly journal "Belgapost" and by publishing monographs on specific topics. Belgapost has an award-winning international reputation and is now moving into the 21st century by becoming available electronically.

Currently catering for all levels of collecting, the Circle holds occasional friendly and informal meetings in London together with a "country" residential weekend, held in late summer at a different location each year. More recently these were joint weekend meetings hosted by the Netherlands Philatelic Circle. There is an exchange packet and several auctions each year providing members with the opportunity of new acquisitions. Regular visits are made to Belgium, usually

coinciding with a National Philatelic Exhibition. For details of membership and an application form

Forces Postal History Society - 65

On 18th October 2017 we celebrated our 65th Anniversary. The inaugural meeting took place on 18th October 1952 when **Colonel G R Crouch** was appointed President and **John A Smith** appointed Chairman. These are names familiar to many military postal historians and not just because they are to be found on covers. Indeed John Smith wrote a regular column on British FPO postmarks in the weekly Stamp Collecting magazine for many years from the early 1950s. The first meeting of the Society did not take place until 24th January 1953 at the Lawns Hotel in South Kensington, then subsequently at the Imperial War Museum; we now meet at the Union Jack Club in Waterloo, London SE1. For the 65th Anniversary year we held a celebratory meeting in March and an anniversary dinner in York in a weekend away to coincide with the biannual York Stamp & Coin Fair in July and we will also be producing an anniversary booklet. We will also celebrate the inaugural meeting with a special members' display on 14th October.

Like many societies our numbers have reduced over the years but we still have a healthy membership. Despite the aging profile of our members we have also embraced modern technology with a website which is kept up-to-date with the society programme, meeting reports and displays of Forces postal history material. We also have a thriving "members only" discussion forum where most queries get answered, an expanding online archive of past Journals and the opportunity to receive new Journals online rather than clutter up homes with

paper! This requires active and forward-thinking members volunteering to assist in running a vibrant society - and we are thankful that such exist within our membership. 65 years young - I hope we can last for another 65 years!



DENNIS FERGUSON COLLINS FRPSL 1930-2017



At the age of 15 Dennis attempted to join the Dundee and District Philatelic Society but was told to come back when he was 16! This he did on 3rd October 1946 and was to become the longest serving member of any Scottish philatelic society. He was President from 1974 to 1977 and was elected an Honorary Member in 1998. He was President of the

Association of Scottish Philatelic Societies in 1975 and, in 2005, was presented with the Award of Merit of the Association "in recognition of his outstanding contribution to the success and enjoyment of Philately in Scotland."

He became a member of the Royal Philatelic Society of London in 1981, a Fellow in 1995 and was one of the first recipients of the 30-Year membership lapel badge. He was a member of the TPO and Seapost Society, the France and Colonies Society, the GB Overprints Society, the Scottish Postal History Society, the Oriental Philatelic Society, the China Philatelic Society of London, the Hong Kong Study Circle, the Perfin Society and the Postcard Club of Tayside. His interest in pillar boxes led him to have one in his garden.

Over the years Dennis built up a collection of China and Hong Kong with special reference to the Boxer War and the Foreign Post Offices in China and displayed this to societies throughout Scotland and in London to the China Philatelic Society and the Royal Philatelic Society. His other collections were mails of the Royal Household, the Hotels and Steamers of Egypt and the Nile, the Steamers of the Italian Lakes, India Used Abroad, the Hotels of Madeira, the Trans-Siberian Railway and its Travelling Post Offices, and Postmarks of Faraway Islands. Recently his interests were the Postal History, Perfins and Postcards of Dundee, Swiss Hotel stationery and cachets, and the Perfins of Morocco, the Levant, Hong Kong and China.

He will be remembered for his depth of knowledge and his willingness to share this, his sense of humour and his excellent displays. He will be greatly missed and our thoughts are with his widow Elspeth, his children Ross and Catriona and his grandchildren.

THE THIRD GERMAN ANTARCTIC EXPEDITION 1938-39

The Third Reich, under the leadership of Adolf Hitler, found they were spending too much money importing seal and whale products for manufacturing food products, such as margarine, and oil for lighting and lubricating machinery, etc. German whaling activities in the Southern Ocean rose from 3 whale factory ships in 1936 to seven factory ships in 1939. In both cases two ships were chartered from the Norwegians.

In May 1938, Reichfeldmarshall Herman Göring, who was in charge of assessing the logistics of increasing the German whaling fleet in the Antarctic,

approached Alfred Ritscher to lead an expedition to Antarctica to collect information about the whaling grounds. Others in the government saw it as a means of expanding German interests in the southern continent and the establishment of a base in Norwegian Maud Dronning Land (=Queen Maud Land).

Lufthansa lent their catapult ship, *Schwabenland*, plus two Dornier Super Wal hydroplanes, *Boreas* and *Passat*¹. Lufthansa, as well as Göring, had

an interest in how the planes coped with polar temperatures.

They dropped 1.50m (5ft) long arrows emblazoned with swastikas to delineate the territories, which became Neuschwabenland² (=New Schwabenland). Also three landings were made to reinforce their claim.

1 The Germans did not have an aircraft carrier. Lufthansa had used the *Schwabenland* and others as floating supply vessels based in the south Atlantic midway between Dakar

and Recife to refuel their hydroplanes which mainly carried mail between Africa and Brazil. The planes landed in the sea, then craned onto the deck to be refuelled and relaunched by catapult.

2 Although the Norwegian's claim had been ratified by the British and others of the Commonwealth countries operating in Antarctica, the Germans chose to ignore it. This claim, of course, was nullified when Germany lost the Second World War.

Early on, getting across the Pacific involved island-hopping: San Francisco, Hawaii, Midway, Wake Island, Guam, Manila (and later Hong Kong). 



The lot cost just £2. They were on Royal Household headed notepaper with the names of Windsor Castle. York Cottage, Balmoral Castle and Buckingham Palace. The mystery was who the letter writer was and what was her royal connection. Janet was assisted with a PowerPoint presentation by Terry highlighting the book's contents and accompanied by over 100 period post card photographs of Royalty of the era. In June **Peter** Chantry gave two separate displays, the Stamps of Touva and Correspondence of Italian POWs interned in East Africa. For example, one of the stamps showed a camel racing a locomotive along Tuva's nonexistent railway. There is still no railway in Tuva. The prisoners' letters to their families were mainly to reassure them that they were in good health. Sue Burns came in July with WWII Mail between Great Britain and Australasia. 


