Editorial

Joy - after the winter shut-downs and Covid 19 reduction of meetings - now the reports have been coming in thick and fast to show that organised philately is back in action across a substantial part of the country. Some societies kept going with Zoom and have found that the interest generated and the possibilities of wider appeal



are very great. Monthly meetings are continuing for some - based on many local or specialist societies as well as the two national ones. "Visits" between distant societies are becoming a feature of a number of programmes. Also the membership of these meetings is spreading wider and wider - not just for the Royal but for most local societies too. They come from Germany, USA, South Africa, Malta and many other places - all linked by our joy in sharing our philately and all are welcome. New means of building contacts have been explored - Facebook, new websites actively maintained (nothing worse than a website showing 2019's programme) and now an active contact between two specialist societies in distant lands - see the Sudan Study Group anniversary report on page 10.

But there is another side to this. We have heard of societies that have closed their doors for the last time and others whose numbers have fallen to seriously low numbers. In these societies the difficulties in persuading people to take on specific posts become increasingly great. Even well-populated societies have this problem. Perhaps it is time for new looks at who does what, how jobs are distributed - indeed how societies are run. If you have found a way round these problems, why not share it with everyone. I am sure that we could feature ideas in ABPS News and probably on the website too (not my responsibility!). Of course there will be some things that do not work as well as hoped, but sharing those might stop others from going down the same rocky path.

As I write this in early January, I am looking forward to two big events. The York Stamp Fair is in two weeks time - will it be able to go ahead? - we hope so. There might be new restrictions or different arrangements but the chance to be able to see people again, to look through dealers' material in person and to spend some money is definitely something to look forward to. A month later comes long-awaited LONDON2022 (ex 2020). Again I intend to be there - even more people to meet, purchases to make, displays and competition entries to see - thinking that I could, or more likely couldn't, do better. This is an opportunity for you to tell me in person what you think of ABPS News - positives very welcome, positive suggestions for improvement even more so, but don't expect sudden changes - I am a creature of habit. It has taken me nine years to make changes from the format handed over to me by Dr John Gledhill. The biggest is going digital and that apparently was a good idea - another positive from the pandemic, but we keep the printed version too. *Keith Burton FRPSL*

Society anniversaries

According to the date of foundation shown in the societies' information on our records, significant anniversaries include those shown below (though several societies have not let us known their foundation date, so there may be more).

100th Anniversary - Cambridge Philatelic Society

The trials and tribulations of the Cambridge Philatelic Society Centenary Almost all the celebrations of our Centenary have at long last been satisfactorily achieved despite the several delays and cancellations caused by the Covid 19 pandemic.

The first face-to-face meeting since the pandemic started was held by us as an informal outdoor Garden Party on 25th July 2021 where members and partners met, fortunately on a fine sunny afternoon. A special Centenary Cake decorated with a reproduction of the Centenary cover stamp and postmark was consumed!

The main celebratory event of the year was the Centenary Luncheon which took place successfully at the Arundel House Hotel in Cambridge, where thirty-one members and guests assembled on 29th November. It had only been delayed some thirteen months since the actual original intended date! There were sixteen members present, mainly with their partners. On previous special anniversaries we have been honoured by the presence of the Cambridge Mayor

and on this occasion Councillor Russ McPherson was our guest of honour. After a welcome from the president, the mayor proposed a toast 'to the next hundred years of the society, sorry the next ninety-nine years!'. Other special invited guests came from as far as Kings Lynn, representing neighbouring societies who had helped with our society activities during the past year. John Spencer represented the Mid Anglia Philatelic Federation.

Alas, other plans for displays to neighbouring societies and to the public fell by the wayside, victims of the pandemic. However, there remains one final step in the celebration of our centenary and

that is the completion of our Centenary Book, which is being compiled by the president with contributions from society members. It will be covering firstly the history of the society, its members and events, and secondly selected aspects of its postal history. It is designed to complement and supplement our first curator,

Derrick Muggleton's *Postal History of Cambridge*. It is intended that this book will be completed in 2022.

The president would like to say a special 'Thank You and Well Done' to all the members and friends who contributed to the organisation of our various celebratory events, but especially **Peter Morton** (secretary), **Graham Wylde** (treasurer) and **Rufus Barnes**. **Shiela McNally** kindly made the Centenary Cake, and **Christine Wylde** took the photographs at the Centenary Luncheon.

The Southampton & District Philatelic Society - 90 Years

On 17th May 1932 an article appeared in the Southern Daily Echo announcing the preliminary meeting of the Southampton Philatelic Society at Lowman's Café, Above Bar. Due to the Second World War the society had to close but on 28th January 1946, it re-formed. During the war all of the society records were destroyed due to bombing so it had to start from new.

We grew slowly over the following years with the society publication *Postmark* appearing in 1948. It is still in 2022 our flagship publication. From the 20th to the 24th May 1952 we organised the 34th Annual Philatelic Congress of Great Britain at the Polygon Hotel and, in 1982, hosted the 64th British Philatelic Federation Congress of Great Britain. We have continued to grow and in 2021 our membership stands at 161. We look to our 90th birthday in 2022 and have a program containing many events around the figure '90' but this at the moment (December 2021) will depend on the current situation of Covid19 and the Omicron variant so please check our website for program updates.

75th Anniversary of Luton & District Philatelic Society - November 1945 to November 2020

- celebrated one year late due to the pandemic!

It finally happened! Despite being delayed by a year, members and invited guests were able to celebrate it on Friday 5th November. After the welcomes we were given a brief history.

In August 1945 20 people (all men) attended an initial get-together in Luton to "unite a large number of unattached enthusiasts to form a strong philatelic society worthy of the District." The first "official" meeting of the society took place on 23rd November 1945 at the George Hotel, Luton. There were 50+ attendees and 41 became fully paid-up members. The first speaker at the opening meeting was **Mr Armstrong** - Editor of Stamp Collecting Magazine. From the outset it was difficult to attract junior members (nothing changes!). The first lady member joined in 1953.

The meeting venue has changed a number of times over the years. Most recently, we have been meeting at Bushmead School for almost 25 years, usually on the first Friday of the month, between 7.00pm and 9.30pm. We have held a number of postage stamp exhibitions in the town over the years.

The first was in 1953, when there were 9257 visitors! Luton Society also hosted the first UK Thematics Exhibition in 1970, followed by thematic exhibitions in 1971, 1972, 1974 and 1976. For our 50th Anniversary an Exhibition of Postage Stamps was held at Luton Museum. It ran from 13th January to 3rd March 1996 and more than 2000 people attended in the first week alone! A limited edition of 250 commemorative covers was prepared, cancelled with a special slogan and hand-stamp. The slogan was also applied to mail at Luton Sorting Office from December 1st 1995 to March 3rd 1996.

Our membership peaked in the 1970s, with 60 paid-up members. Since then numbers have dwindled steadily and there are now only 15 hardy individuals.

After the history we were treated to displays of *GB Postage Due Labels* and *Falkland Islands* stamps by members. This was followed by a free buffet and a grand raffle with 26 prizes up for grabs! To finish the evening, there were displays of *Liechtenstein* stamps and a thematic collection of *Orchids*. Everyone was thanked for attending and making the night so special. Feedback afterwards from invited guests was extremely positive, particularly as they had all won raffle prizes! → *finodon@hotmail.com*Fin O'Donoghue

50 Years - Cornwall Philatelic Federation

To mark our 50th Anniversary 25 members and guests gathered at the "Inn for All Seasons" near Redruth on 7th November 2021 where we enjoyed a delicious carvery and dessert. The Cornwall Federation of Philatelic Societies, as originally named, was formed at an inaugural meeting at Falmouth on 9th November 1971 with seven clubs being represented - Falmouth, Helston, Liskeard, Newquay, St Austell, Truro and West Cornwall. In 1985 the name of the Federation was



shortened to Cornwall Philatelic Federation. Over the last 50 years the fortunes of the CPF have waxed and waned, with 11 clubs at its peak. The recent closure of Liskeard PS has reduced our numbers to 6 clubs - Falmouth, Launceston, Newquay, Redruth, St. Austell and Truro. The Cornish clubs have a close working relationship with CPF with club representatives attending actual or virtual meetings to coordinate philatelic activities in Cornwall. Annual fairs are held at Launceston, Redruth and Newquay (St Eval) together with the County's CORNEX held at Pensilva near Liskeard. CORNEX attracts visitors from across the South West, with 19 dealers present this year.

Redditch Philatelic Society - 50th Anniversary 1971-2021

The society was formed when a group of local collectors decided to form a club and hold regular meetings. These were held monthly on a Monday initially and, as our membership grew, this was extended to meeting twice monthly, with the

second meeting on a Thursday to give members a different evening of the week to meet. Our meetings were at The Smallwood Almshouses in Redditch; one of our members was secretary and a trustee, so it made sense for us to support them. Meetings were originally a simple affair. Members brought along swaps in stockbooks for everyone to hunt through. As we became more established, we began inviting guest speakers, which is a marvellous way to view material that we would not usually come across, and to



learn more about our hobby at the same time. We soon began holding stamp fairs at various local venues. These were well supported by local dealers, members and the many collectors in the area. By the end of 1979 we had five stamp fairs and an auction under our belts.

We joined our local philatelic federation – the Midland Philatelic Federation (MPF), and also the British Philatelic Federation Ltd (forerunner of the current ABPS). This enabled our members to have access to far more information and knowledge, in addition to meeting fellow collectors from further afield. In 1986 we hosted both the MPF Spring Convention and in the autumn our own Annual Stamp Fair. At our most recent fair in 2015, we hosted the MPF Autumn Convention and competitions.

In 1987 we joined the Three Counties Federation of Philatelic Societies, covering Worcestershire, Herefordshire and Gloucestershire. Sadly, this Federation is no longer in existence, but we provided no less than three presidents and a secretary and also hosted four Federation Conventions and Federation quizzes. Also in 1987, we began what has been an unbroken run of annual Stamp and Postcard Auctions. These are still popular over thirty years later and still attract collectors from a wide area.

In 1993 we changed our meeting venue as a result of the conversion of the Almshouses building into social housing, and we decamped to nearby St George's Church Hall. When the church premises were closed in 2011 we moved to the current base: The Bridge Church Memorial Hall on Evesham Road. This hall is large enough to enable the society to run our 500-lot auction each year and currently to provide ample space for meetings with social



distancing. To improve communications for members and other philatelists, we introduced our website: www.redditchphilatelic.org.uk

During last year's lockdown, we turned to Zoom to continue our meetings. Since September we have returned to physical meetings. We still meet twice a month, but on the first and third Thursday evenings.

Our members' interests cover all aspects of philately: traditional stamps, postal history, postcards and thematics. A number of members have been successful in federation and national competitions and this participation is actively encouraged. We run four competitions each year, the most popular being the one-sheet competition which regularly gets more than twenty-five entries. The first fifty years have seen the development of a well-established stamp club and a membership of keen philatelists who really enjoy their hobby. Our philosophy has always been: "Philately is fun" and we strive to ensure everyone makes this a reality.

Sudan Study Group - 45 Years

We are celebrating our Sapphire Anniversary (45 years) in 2022! As part of that occasion we have launched a major recruitment campaign, perhaps using approaches that might be of interest to other societies? The strategy consists of several prongs. We are:



- 1. offering 2 years electronic membership for the price of one
- promoting this offer on our Sudan Stamps Facebook Group pages (over 400 members)
- 3. also "selling" this same deal on eBay (because there are always many people looking for Sudan stamps on that site)
- 4. offering half-price Junior membership (under 18 years) for the first time. As a result we have recruited half a dozen new members in just the first couple of weeks (we started just in time for Christmas).

In addition we have decided to broaden our international perspectives by forming an association with the Sudan Philatelic Association (SPA) of Khartoum. The SPA has some 40 members, mostly based in Sudan. We will form a no-cost partnership with them whereby members of either the SSG or the SPA will have access to the other society's publications etc. Already most of the SPA members have joined our Facebook Group and good discussions are starting to flourish (thanks, in part, to Google translate!).

In addition, we plan to hold our AGM in March 2022 as part of an event-packed, residential weekend in Derby. This will be a hybrid Zoom/face-to-face meeting so fingers crossed for good health all round.

4 Understanding the problem... always remember the car trade had their own little 'bible' - Glass's Guide. I've no idea. I've not even looked - in this. internet-dominated world, it may even have disappeared. Well there's an insider Stamp Trade publication for Stamp Dealers called "The Philatelic Exporter". There's nothing that special about it - and you won't learn much or find massively reduced prices by subscribing BUT - it is a forum, a paper focal point, a last 'bastion' in this on-line transparent world that we inhabit. whereby dealers (and auctioneers) cantry and communicate with each other. I publish my own articles there...

Recently 1 discussed the outcome of my 10 years' simple research, asking dealers and auctioneers 'what is your biggest problem?'

To a man, (why are we almost all men), they replied — "my biggest problem is stock, if I can get more of the right stock I can sell it easily"

Strange that, nobody ever asked me the same question back – because my answer would have been entirely different (and I don't treat it as a problem) – I seek to satisfy more collector clients than any other stamp

This is the reason why my company has such massive advertising. This is the reason why we spend up to 8% of turnover – up to £200,000 per armum in marketing costs. (Most dealers don't even sell £200K per armum).

5 Why is that? Because, as the world revoked the Stamp Market, imperceptibly Changed, and incrementally—Massively

So, although few will tell you this, it's clearly evident that the problem for most Sellers of Stamps today is no longer absent stock — but absent collectors in the place they choose to sell their stamps in, Simply put, other Dealers, Auctions, Stamp Fairs have not invested in marketing to have a strong Customer-core. To be fair, this is not true of all - but it is true of most - so that our former competitor 'Apex' had 800 bidders in a recent auction. In my most recent 20,000+ lot UPA 77th Auction we had 1,793 different bidders from 49 different countries, 95% of whom were Collectors. Some other well-advertised auctions only have 200 bidders (a high percentage of whom are dealers - so that, essentially they are Dealer-dominated auctions) - so that when you sell through them - you're paying up to 18% (including VAT) seller's commission and the buyer is paying up to 25% and more in Buyer's Premium, credit card fees, on-line bidding fee, delivery and insurance etc ... AND all of that so that your stamps may be sold, wait for it - TO DEALERS (and some collectors), but Dealers, that naturally must make a profit to survive ...

Now, let's examine the cost implications - Example: Your stamp collection sells in public auction for £800. Upon a 25% buyer's prenyum, the dealer pays £1,000 and it could be more. He breaks it into £2,000+ selling price (much lower and he'll go out of business). The auction charges you a seller's commission of up to 18% (VAT included) upon the £800 sale price. This is GBP£144. Therefore you receive approaching £656 - which is approximately 33% of the dealer's £2,000+/- retail selling price - BUT... now that we have identified the problem...

> Isn't the Solution Staring us Right in The Face ?

Why Pay an Auction to Sell to Dealers: Sell to Collectors instead? In our example with buyer's premium, sellers commission, lotting fees, extra credit card charges, VAT and even insurance—you're already being charged in different ways up to 40% of the selling price to sell, possibly or probably, to the wrong person.

Why not direct that 40% cost you're paying to sell to Collectors instead? Sounds good, so why hasn't this been done before?

obvious so that money may be taken, almost surreptitiously, in numerous different ways, (without us apparently noticing until we see the cheque in our pocket) - the transparent 'seller pays' has been deliberately 'obscured' so much so that, amazingly, the latest 2017 European Auction Selling Legislation just introduced - now requires auctions that charge 'buyer's premiums' to warn the buyer in advance. Just imagine going into the petrol station, and being warned that the price you're paying to put fuel in you tank is not the real price, you have to pay a premium! Obviously, there would be an uproar...

9 How can you cut out the middleman and sell to Collectors instead? Well, I can think of two ways. 1). DIY - Do It Yourself selling on eBay. That may be fine for lower grade material - but, would you risk auctioning relatively unprotected rare material on eBay. If We don't and we're professionals, so we should know what we're doing. Or 2). Cut out the extra middle-man. Use my company. UPA, which reaches collectors instead. Here's how it works: Continuing from our previous Example:

The auction sold your stamps to a dealer for £1,000 - but You received circa £656

UPA sells them to collectors for you for up to £2,000 even after 40% commission you receive up to £1,200. Up to £544 more. Now that's amazing, just it?

Sounds Good Andrew, but Can You 'Deliver'? Obviously, nothing is as simple as that, and as we auction stamps to collectors some collections may 'break' to the example £2.000+/- but the stamps may be sold for more or less - especially as we reserve all lots at 20% below, (Estimate £2,000 = £1,600 reserve) and not everything sells first or even 2nd time so prices may come down... Naturally, it's not that straightforward for a dealer either - he may sell at a discount to 'move' stock OR. like many dealers he may be sitting on the same unsold stamps, that you see time and time again, in dealer's stocks years later and still at the same unattractive prices... So, I think it is more reasonable for you to expect up to 36% to 50% more. indirectly or directly via my Collector's



A New Club on the ABPS Block:

Introducing 'The American Stamp Club of Great Britain'

Whoa there! We're not that new. In 1954 our founder, Edgar Chase, asked Kenneth Chapman, editor of *Stamp Collecting*, if there was a philatelic society in Britain that catered for collectors of United States. He was told "No. But if you want to start one, I'll give you a free advert." And so, a few weeks later a small group of United States collectors met in a shipping office in Leadenhall Street in London, and **The American Stamp Club of Great Britain** was born.

I joined soon after, and learned a great deal about United States philately attending meetings in that same Leadenhall shipping office. The Club grew and a library was established, and circulating packets of stamps for sale began under the supervision of a Packet Organiser. Rules were established and an Annual General Meeting was inaugurated. We became a properly regulated Club. I guess this is the pattern of most societies.

The Club is constituted as a Mutual Society for tax purposes. We currently run three different packet circuits for Stamps, FDC/Postal History, and Revenues/ Cinderellas. Our journal, **The Mayflower**, publishes quarterly, free to members, with news, articles and a postal auction included. We run a New Issues service, and have a Library available for members to borrow books, which cover most aspects of United States philately. We hold an Annual Convention with an AGM and Competition. We are affiliated to the American Philatelic Society. And all for just £10 a year. New members pay a once-only £5 joining fee. We welcome both beginners and advanced collectors. Russian Currency Stamps

During 1915-1916 the Imperial Russian Government disintegrated under the pressures of WWI. From 1915 to 1917 Russia issued eleven "currency stamps" - ungummed postage stamps printed on thin cardboard instead of stamp paper. They were meant to be used as coins to save metal.

The first three currency stamps were issued in 10, 15 and 20 Kopeks values. The designs used the 1913 Tercentenary of the Romanov Dynasty commemoratives. The original printing plates were used, so they appear exactly like genuine postage stamps. However printed on the reverse is "Having circulation on a par with silver money".



10, 15 and 20 Kopek values. Silver coins surcharge

The Germans counterfeited the 15 and 20 Kopek stamps, changing the last three lines to anti-Russian messages. The purpose was to undermine the value of Russian currency and destroy confidence in the Imperial Government.



German counterfeit 15 and 20 Kopek stamps overprinted to the reverse with anti-Russian messages

Surcharged anti-Russian messages:

"Has the circulating equivalent of with bankrupt silver coins" 15 Kopek stamp

"Has the circulating equivalent of a robbing and deceitful ruler" 20 Kopek stamp

Late in 1916 the second issue of currency stamps appeared in 1, 2 and 3 Kopek values; the 1 and 2 Kopek values were uncirculated. A revised inscription was printed on the reverse "Having circulation equivalent with copper money"



1,2 and 3 Kopek values. Copper coins surcharge

In January 1917, a third issue of currency stamps was produced with overprinted 1 and 2 Kopek surcharged values to the front, the reverse surcharged remained as the 1916 issue.



1 and 2 Kopek numeral surcharged values. Copper money surcharge.



March-April 1917. 1, 2 and 3 Kopek values surcharged 1 and 2. Copper money surcharge.

By March-April 1917, the Provisional Government issued the fourth and final set of three currency stamps, 1, 2 and 3 Kopek values. Surcharged 1 and 2 Kopek values on the front of the first two values, and a new surcharge overprint to the reverse with a numeral.

The ABPS Congress Medal

The 2022 Congress Medal has been awarded to **Michael J Roberts** of Huddersfield. Mike's philatelic life can be traced back to his fourth birthday when he started collecting. He joined Huddersfield Philatelic Society aged eight and four years later was Junior Representative on that society's committee. Sixty years later he remains a member having fulfilled a number of committee positions in the intervening years.

Mike has proved there is enthusiasm for local societies. As a firm believer in daytime meetings, he proposed establishing West Riding Stamp Club, acting as contact for many years. Interestingly, the Club does not, by choice, have elected officers. Similarly, in 2014 he established Cockermouth Stamp Club with Mike Mapleton. This has grown to twenty local members, plus many more joining its Zoom events. Through Mike's enterprise in organising two auctions a year, now with 500+ lots per sale, both clubs have raised their profile within the wider philatelic and local communities.

Not content with just being a member of various specialist societies he has held office in the West African Study Circle and the Sarawak Specialists' Society and is currently the secretary of Cumbria Postal History Society. He founded the Pakistan Study Circle in 2000 with three other members since when he has been active on the committee. At the same time, he has served on the Council of the Royal Philatelic Society London and is currently a Regional Representative and has been the Secretary, President and Chairman of the Society for Postal Historians.

From grass root societies to International Exhibitions Mike is very active in all categories of philately. He was a member of the Organising Committee for the London Internationals held in 2010 and 2015 and is a member of the Core Team for London 2020/2022, with responsibility for staffing.

As a keen numismatist he has encouraged links between stamp collectors and coin collectors, giving philatelic displays to the latter and lectures on various numismatic topics to the former.

Mike has been a keen supporter of ABPS and a Friend since its inception. He has encouraged several philatelic societies, of which he is a member, to join or re-join the ABPS and for the last few years has declined invitations to give displays to societies which are not affiliated to ABPS.

For upwards of twenty years Mike has provided advice, usually on a pro bono basis, to executors and family members regarding the disposal of philatelic material.

Mike Roberts was nominated by Cockermouth Stamp Club and the Society of Postal Historians and is a worthy recipient of the ABPS Congress Medal for 2022

A Thematic Example

Problems with Banking?

A Response to the Editorial in ABPS News Winter 2021

I read with interest about multiple signatures being a (potential) barrier to online banking for societies. It needn't be. I am secretary of a small limited company with 35K turnover, which is set up to look after the maintenance of the block of flats in which I live. We have recently gone through the "closure of accounts" trauma, and have switched from Nationwide to Metro Bank. We have a compound service which, although largely digital, also has a debit card. Multiple signatories are permitted and (to date) no charges are made for cheque processing although we are now >95% digital. We have three signatories on our account: a primary signatory (treasurer, who acts as focal point), but the other signatories (secretary and chairman) have equal access to the banking app, equal approval rights for payments, and a debit card each.

The process to switch accounts was quick, about 30 minutes per signatory, and we have had no issues so far with how our account has been run.

The equal approval rights on the app simply means that we have to talk to each other more, which is no bad thing.

A lot of homework went into this decision, and in the end Metro Bank were the only one which ticked all our boxes. Starling Bank promise much, but delivered very little.

Another Philatelic Society, of which I am treasurer, still clings on to a community account with Lloyds, but I suspect that this won't last for much longer (though it's a race between the demise of the society and the account...)

Grimsby and District



On 11th December, **Andrew Norris** opened with a display from *Labuan 1925-8*



correlating with steamship sailing days. **Susan McEwen** followed with *Malacca from 1800 to 1941*. **Nick Hervey** gave a display including modern *Malaysian telephone cards*. **Peter Cockburn** brought correspondence in BMA period from a lady of pleasure in Penang to a service man. **Michael Waugh** gave a display of personal correspondence between a senior officer seconded to the Indian Army Ordinance Corp and his wife in Bangalore. He was eventually ordered to escape from Singapore but drowned when the Dutch ship on which he embarked from Padang was torpedoed off Sumatra. *Michael Waugh*

Royal PS of London

A 1d wrapper of the King George V era from Grenada. Despite the fact that 61 836 were printed, this is the only known used example shown by **Simon Richards FRPSL** in his 7th October display of Grenada.



Members were delighted that easing of travel restrictions, and determination to give his presentation personally, meant they could enjoy the magnificent display on Siam: The Early Years by Prakob Chirakiti RDP FRPSL. We marvelled at the outstanding material, detailing the first two stamp issues of Siam, with proofs, essays, varieties, blocks and usage, much being unique. A Whale's Tale by Lesley Marley FRPSL was a very different kettle of fish. A Large Gold standard thematic display like this is a careful creation over many years - there are no catalogues or textbooks. Finland at War showed the struggles faced by Finland in defending her borders from a philatelic perspective, in the display by Michael Elliott FRPSL. He followed a timeline from 1808 through to 1945. Every phase was recorded with fine material, much difficult to acquire. Grace Davies FRPSL brought Peace in early December. She took us through stages of peace: the aftermath of war; the peace conferences, sometimes resulting in a treaty; the League of Nations and United Nations, their reputations and failures; the symbols of peace - the dove and olive branch, the peace rose; Alfred Nobel and the Peace Prize. The display on Decorative Writing Paper by John Scott FRPSL was another significant variation from the norm. He traced the evolution of decorated writing paper that emerged first in the late 18th century. At first the decoration was applied by hand, later turning to engraving, embossing, lacework, and the development of lithography and photography.

Weekend Conference Report, 24-26 September 2021

I am delighted to report that the Conference was able to take place essentially as normal, with the bonus that some sessions were combined with those of the Postal History Society, who happened to be using the same venue. Highlights included a double serving of items from **Majed Halawi**'s unrivalled collection of Sierra Leone stamps, postal stationery and postal history, **Tony Plumbe**'s Biafra (accepted for entry to London 2022), and **Bernard Mabbett**'s St Helena Boer POW Mail.

London Meeting, 6th November 2021

We were very glad to be back at Abchurch Lane for a meeting, augmented by our new video equipment for recording and streaming the displays and Zoom to allow participation in the AGM. **Dave Taylor**, the RPSL Custodian, commented on how good it was to see societies returning for their meetings. The venue has taken sensible steps to reduce infection transmission, with a temperature check on arrival and (temporary) use of disposable drinks cups.

The main displays were provided by **Ian Anderson**: *Gold Coast stamps*, including one of only three known examples of the 1d on 4d surcharge formerly listed as SG 8c, and **Rob May**: *Nigerian Internal Mail Routes*, including seasonal use of the Cross and Benue rivers. Members' displays encompassed *airmail covers*, *postmarks from Gold Coast villages*, *Freetown and its environs* and *modern Nigerian types*, *Insufficiently Paid markings from Nigeria* and *Biafran Government Press Communiques from 1968*.

Review, The History of Airmail in Poland and Its Contribution to Airmail Services of Europe (1914-1939), by Dr. Jerzy W. Kupiec-Weglinski



Published by the Collectors Club of Chicago, 2021. This English edition is accompanied by Synopsis and Table of Contents in Polish and German. The monograph, prefaced by Oxford-based Nobel Prize nominated historian Norman Davies, focuses on the development and operations of airmail services on the Polish territories throughout 25 years of turbulent European history during the 20th century. It begins with events originating in WWI in a remote area of the former Austro-Hungarian Empire's Galicia Province. It concludes with the German invasion of Poland in September 1939 and the outbreak of WWII. It is an in-depth encyclopedic history of the development of air post services not only in Poland but also in all of Europe and beyond.

The substantive material is presented in twelve chapters. The first chapter highlights the 1914-1915 airmail effort by the Austrian Army as the Russian forces besieged the city of Przemyśl. The following chapter includes comprehensive descriptions and illustrations of the airmail postal route in 1918 from Vienna to Kyiv via Krakow and Lviv. Further chapters detail the development of domestic airmail operations, as well as joint services by Polish and foreign carriers to other countries and continents, air rallies, crash (interrupted) mail, and the Zeppelin mail from mainland Poland and the Free City of Danzig to the Americas. There are many tables and appendices which provide useful information about cancellations, cachets, miscellaneous postal marking, quantities of airmail carried between various cities, airmail labels used on the covers, a survey of Graf Zeppelin dispatches from Poland to South America, and much more.

The book is well researched and contains a wealth of information about early Polish & European airmail and will be essential for aerophilatelists interested in that area.

The handbook is hardbound in an 8½" x 11" format (21.5 x 28 cm) and includes 385 pages containing over 700 colour illustrations. The bibliography records the published and semi-published texts which give historical and biographical information about the organisation and development of philately in Great Britain and Ireland. It is intended to underpin continuing work to record and understand the history of philately, and philatelic societies in particular, including its development and its context in economic, political and social terms.

As little has been written, in recent years, on this subject this work should be viewed as a work in progress with a special focus on Philatelic Society history. STANLEY GIBBONS REDUCTION IN LINES OF ALBUM STOCKS AND EXTRA PAGES

When I visited Dauwalders in Salisbury recently I enquired about purchasing additional blank pages for a Stanley Gibbons *Exeter* album, which I had purchased there shortly before their Covid lockdown. To my amazement I was advised that they no longer had any additional pages, as Gibbons had discontinued the line totally and seemingly several other lines at the same time. At one time there was a supplier of loose-leaf albums named *Frank Godden*. They had a small retail outlet at 110/111 Strand, London and produced very good quality hand-made albums with a variety of blank pages. They were the *FG Warwick, a* two-peg binder, and the smaller *FG Graduate,* taking identical pages. When Goddens went out of business their range of albums was reproduced by Gibbons, who initially named the larger album as *Plymouth*, but subsequently sold a similar-sized album as *Devon* and a smaller version as *Exeter*. The dimensions of the pages for these albums identically matched those of Goddens, so it all worked satisfactorily.

I have written a letter of dismay and protest to the Chief Executive Officer, Mr Graham Shircore, at Stanley Gibbons. His prompt response (reduced) was

Thank you for taking the time to get in touch with us. I am sorry that it is a result of unhappiness on your part. When we reviewed our album range over two years ago it was not something which we undertook lightly. We knew that some of the decisions we would make would not be popular, but we also knew it was absolutely necessary. The range as it was had a number of different issues which resulted in a poor and inconsistent customer experience and offering. Added to this, it was, in the round, not economically viable and some suppliers were no longer operating. In short, it was, unfortunately, not sustainable.

As Mr Shircore wrote above not the answer that I was seeking! At least I tried to influence a more satisfactory outcome. As an aside, the sales assistant on the telephone at Vera Trinder told me that barely a day goes by without an enquiry about *Devon* pages. Perhaps Stanley Gibbons have not done their homework quite correctly?
