This is why I really want to hear from you; from federations, societies, clubs or individuals. What are your thoughts about where the hobby is and its future? What should we be doing? As those there will know, I had transport problems at the end - the response from my contacts was very supportive and showed the positive social side of being a collector. Many thanks to them all. Despite a very late night I was back in York for the two days of the Stamp Fair.

As usual this was another chance to meet people for a chat about stamps, covers and what was happening in their life. There were also new people to meet and to point in the direction of their local or specialist society. It was interesting to hear how they had returned to collecting - usually by finding an old album during lockdown, and now looking to expand or develop one particular area. It is a golden opportunity to reach out and share our enjoyment and knowledge. One had tried to find a local society but had not managed to find anything online for the city in which he lived. Perhaps we need to think about how or even if we advertise. Online buying has increased but the big fairs are still working. Another memo to self: Don't forget to go to the local one-day fair - there might be something there too - and take that updated wants list.

Yes - there is a lot that's positive - we mustn't lose sight of that when we are considering the future. The balance is important - enjoy your hobby, help others, talk to each other, be responsive if someone asks for help, think of something new that might help and do your bit. Anyone like to be an editor?

Solihull - 50 years



Solihull gathers to celebrate

Celebrations for our 50th Anniversary went on hold due to Covid. However in early July we held our Anniversary Dinner at the Solihull Voco St John's Hotel. Originally planned as the culmination of our 50th season it had to be postponed. Members and guests gathered for an enjoyable dinner with a toast to the society and a speech from **Dane Garrod** who paid tribute to the society's success and to three current officers in particular who between them have given over 100 years of service: **Bryan Jones**, packet secretary, **Gerald Marriner**, programme secretary, and **Paul Woodness**, secretary. Three of our current members were at the first meeting: **Gerald Marriner**, **John Barker** and **Richard Periam**.

The society was formed in 1970. At the time, most big cities had thriving philatelic societies with their origins going back to the turn of the century. With changes in peoples' work, life style and residence there was a need to meet like minded people closer to home. **John Nicholson**, a local stamp collector, placed an advert in the local newspaper asking interested stamp collectors to attend a meeting. This was held at the Solihull Cricket & Tennis Club in Marsh Lane where John was a member. About 40 enthusiastic collectors from all walks of life attended this meeting. The society was born and a programme of weekly meetings arranged. Since then we have continued to meet every Tuesday at this venue during the months September through to April up to the present day.

Over the years we have been privileged to see displays of top-class material from some internationally-recognised collectors and enjoyed many entertaining and informative talks. One of our founder members, **Gerald Marriner**, who has

been our programme secretary since the early days, continues to provide us with a programme which is the envy of many others.

Although many of our 71 members are mainly stamp collectors who are happy to collect at home with the help of our exchange packet, we are also proud to boast that we have 16 members who give regular talks to other societies, on a variety of subjects, dealing with *Stamps and Postal History of Fiji*, *Germany*, *Registration Mail*, *Andorra*, *Belgian Congo*, *India*, 19th *Century mail to and from Australia*, *Morocco*, *Greek Islands* and many more. Perhaps the most unusual is the extensive collection of *Postal Orders and National Savings Stamps*.

As part of our 50th Anniversary celebrations we are holding an Auction of stamps, post cards and coins on 6th November 2022 at Knowle Village Hall, the venue for the monthly Knowle Stamp Fair. All proceeds will go to the Marie Curie West Midlands Hospice. Any donations would be most welcome. We have managed to keep our meetings friendly and informal, always welcoming collectors from beginners to the experienced.

Congratulations to Simon Martin-Redman

On the 25th April our member **Simon Martin-Redman** showed his Large Gold International Display to 25 members of the Frinton and District PS. This display was of stamps and postal history of Sarawak. The significance of this display was that it was a preview of Simon's collection of Sarawak that he has been accumulating for 37 years. Simon is a Fellow of the Royal Philatelic Society, London, and he has just returned in May from the World Stamp Show, HELVETIA 2022 held in Lugano, Switzerland, where his exhibit won the International Grand Prix. This is the world's highest award for a stamp exhibit.

The former British Colony of Sarawak is situated on the north coast of the island of Borneo in Indonesia. Simon told tales of piracy and uncomfortable working conditions in this country, when, in 1841, Sir James Brooke worked for the Sultan of Brunei, ridding pirates from the seas around the North of Borneo. He was so successful that the Sultan awarded a huge tract of land, on the north coast of Borneo, to Sir James Brooke (known as the Rajah) which was known as Sarawak. Initially there were only about 30 Europeans in the whole of Sarawak and even by 1910 there were only 100. There was obviously little use for a postal service and stamps of India and later Straight Settlements were used on letters and packets sent out of the country. In 1869 Sarawak issued its own stamps but it wasn't until 1897, when Sarawak joined the Universal Postal Union, that their stamps were valid all over the world.

Simon displayed rare postal covers and stamps, some in small sheets of stamps, together with various proofs of stamps that printers were seeking to print for the Brooke family. These proofs were miniature works of art. Old stamps and covers from Sarawak are not only very rare but because of the stifling equatorial heat they are difficult to keep in good condition, hence the rarity of these items. With the coming of WWII and the Japanese Invasion the stamps of Sarawak were not valid for post and people had to use Japanese issues.

After the war Sarawak remained under the control of the Brooke family until 1946 when it was ceded to Great Britain and administered as a Crown Colony. There is no doubt that Simon's collection of stamps and postal history from Sarawak is the best in the world which has now been proved. Simon's achievement in winning this award not only reflects on his ability to compile such a collection but also reflects well on this country in the field of international philately. All of us in the Frinton and Walton PS are delighted at Simon's achievement, something that he has been striving to win for very many years.

Federations - A Birth and a Death

In 1958 I was privileged to represent the Salisbury PS at the inaugural meeting in Devizes founding the Wiltshire Federation. This year I hosted a Kent Federation ECM at which we decided to disband this federation, the posts of president, president-elect, treasurer and competitions secretary being vacant since the start of the pandemic, with no volunteers to step in - there was some rather patronising advice, but zero help. We did manage to get all remaining committee members save one who had family health problems to attend this meeting, one via Zoom.

When I joined the federation council, some 17 years ago, firstly as a society rep then as president-elect, Kent was a vibrant organisation with fairs held across the county and excellent weekend seminars which did not cost the attendees a fortune. Can anyone forget **Ian Harvey**'s excellent seminar on GB booklets? Much of the success was due to a small number who really cared, about both the federation and the hobby, so what went wrong? There were a couple of unfortunate/disastrous appointments, and one "bloody difficult man" but this is not a blame game and they did not really contribute to the demise.

We all believed the pandemic did not help but the real problems appear to be an ageing population, unwillingness for speakers to travel long distances at night, diminishing competition entries, lack of volunteers for office, and lack of help from some of the societies hosting the fairs. The lack of reasonably priced venues for fairs has virtually killed off many of them. In addition, we lost our two main stalwarts, **Maurice Flack** and **Colin Tobbitt**, our "heavy lifters" who for many years, behind the scenes, had transported and managed the display frames; both were taken before their time and both were my good friends. Several others, from my 22 years living in Kent, are worthy of mention and I apologise for any omissions.

Peter O'Keeffe was editor of our well-received journal and only retired after issue 200 - a formidable effort! Jennie Viggars took over as a capable and valued replacement. Past president, Grahame Boutle, twice stepped in for long periods as secretary, also hosting our ECMs, and was well supported by chairman Ron Burn of Tristan da Cunha fame. Michael Dobbs is a fairly recent appointment as communications officer as is Nicola Davies as honorary secretary and both have been worth their weight in gold: Michael will continue to publish a directory of Kent societies and a calendar of meetings, but by email only, so as to incur no costs. Michael and another county member, Geoff Hanney, have also been recognised for their contributions to the hobby, Michael being given an ABPS Award of Merit and Geoff the London Medal for his outstanding work for the "Royal"; well done and well-deserved to both of them. In addition, for 2022 we awarded the Lingley Shield, for service to the hobby, jointly to Michael Dobbs and Michael Thompson. They both made significant contributions over the pandemic to keep the hobby alive.

Despite the demise of the federation, our hobby in the county is in good health, although different. Three societies have merged into the North West Kent PS

and some, including Dartford, have disappeared. This year, my two local societies, NW Kent and Lewisham, have enjoyed some excellent and interesting displays, but interest in exchange packets and auctions has flagged somewhat.

So what to do with our archives, trophies and our money? Our archives shall be stored at the Royal, and probably digitised, as shall any trophies not required to be returned to their donors. The committee was unanimous in voting our remaining funds be given to Stamp Active in the hope this will be investing in the future of the hobby.

Should the federation wish to reform, with maybe a new set of people, then the archives, president's regalia et al could be returned to them, so they would have a recovery package of sorts. It is with great sadness that we have had to perform this duty.

Obituary - Geoff Reynolds 1944 - 2022



Geoff Reynolds had been Hon Secretary of Redcar & Cleveland PS for more than 20 years. His easy manner and willingness to help and support the society members with their collections made him a very popular man. He was also the organiser of the Germany & Colonies group in the northeast and served as Chairman of the Aerophilatelic/Postal History Group for a considerable period. It is likely that these two groups would have folded without the enthusiasm and doggedness of Geoff to keep them going. He was involved with organising three NEPA Conventions as well as being involved with events and

conventions run by the ABPS and the Germany & Colonies Society. In the 1991/92 season he was NEPA president and in 2018 he signed the "Roll of Distinguished North East Philatelists".

Geoff was a numismatist but coins took a back seat to his philately. He had excellent collections of the stamps of France and Germany. His pride and joy was his collection of Zeppelin Mail. He loved giving displays and talks on this subject. He entertained not just philatelists with his

commentaries on his superb material. He rarely, if ever, turned down an invitation to give a display.

At Stampex in 2014 he was awarded a Gold Medal for his entry on Zeppelin Mail and another Gold Medal followed at Adelaide in 2019 with "Commercial Zeppelin Mail". In the competitions held by his local association – NEPA, he won in a number of classes over the years. Geoff was a true Yorkshireman, he loved to talk, he loved

to encourage collectors and he loved to smile and laugh.

He will be greatly missed by many but he will be well-remembered by many more.

therefore Wrong Price X

– Lucky for the seller that 2 well-heeled bidders saw the potential value that day or it could have been given away... the seller could easily have lost out couldn't he? or she?

So, by un-peeling the layers of obfuscation, hopefully we can all agree:

The Secret is Simple – it's ALL ABOUT : TIMING

Plus the 3 Philatelic 'P's Presentation Place And Price

4 Understanding the problem... always remember the car trade had their own little 'bible' - Glass's Guide. I've no idea, I've not even looked - in this internet-dominated world, it may even have disappeared. Well, there's an insider Stamp Trade publication for Stamp Dealers called "The Philatelic Exporter" There's nothing that special about it - and you won't learn much or find massively reduced prices by subscribing BUT - it is a forum, a paper focal point, a last 'bastion' in this on-line transparent world that we inhabit... whereby dealers (and auctioneers) can try and communicate with each other. I publish my own articles there..

Recently I discussed the outcome of my 10 years' simple research, asking dealers and auctioneers 'what is your biggest problem?'

To a man, (why are we almost all men), they replied — "my biggest problem is stock, if I can get more of the right stock I can sell it easily"

Strange that, nobody ever asked me the same question back – because my answer would have been entirely different (and I don't treat it as a problem) – I seek to satisfy more collector clients than any other stamp auction

This is the reason why my company has such massive advertising. This is the reason why we spend up to 8% of turnover – up to £200,000 per annum in marketing costs. (Most dealers don't even sell £200K per annum).

So, although few will tell you this, it's clearly evident that the problem for most Sellers of Stamps today is no longer absent stock – but absent collectors in

the place they choose to sell their stamps in. Simply put, other Dealers, Auctions, Stamp Fairs have not invested in marketing to have a strong Customer-core. To be fair, this is not true of all - but it is true of most - so that our former competitor 'Apex' had 800 bidders in a recent auction. In my most recent 20,000+ lot UPA 77th Auction we had 1,793 different bidders from 49 different countries, 95% of whom were Collectors. Some other well-advertised auctions only have 200 bidders (a high percentage of whom are dealers - so that, essentially they are Dealer-dominated auctions) - so that when you sell through them - you're paying up to 18% (including VAT) seller's commission and the buyer is paying up to 25% and more in Buyer's Premium, credit card fees, on-line bidding fee, delivery and insurance etc... AND all of that so that your stamps may be sold, wait for it - TO DEALERS (and some collectors), but Dealers, that naturally must make a profit to survive...

Now, let's examine the cost implications - Example: Your stamp collection sells in public auction for £800. Upon a 25% buyer's premium, the dealer pays £1,000 and it could be more. He breaks it into £2,000+ selling price (much lower and he'll go out of business). The auction charges you a seller's commission of up to 18% (VAT included) upon the £800 sale price. This is GBP£144. Therefore you receive approaching £656 - which is approximately 33% of the dealer's £2,000+/- retail selling price - BUT... now that we have identified the problem...

obvious so that money may be taken, almost surreptitiously, in numerous different ways, (without us apparently noticing until we see the cheque in our pocket) - the transparent 'seller pays' has been deliberately 'obscured' - so much so that, amazingly, the latest 2017 European Auction Selling Legislation just introduced - now requires auctions that charge 'buyer's premiums' to warn the buyer in advance. Just imagine going into the petrol station, and being warned that the price you're paying to put fuel in you tank is not the real price, you have to pay a premium! Obviously, there would be an uproar...

How can you cut out the middleman sell and Collectors instead? Well, I can think of two ways. 1). DIY - Do It Yourself selling on eBay. That may be fine for lower grade material - but, would you risk auctioning relatively unprotected rare material on eBay ? We don't and we're professionals, so we should know what we're doing. Or 2). The 1955 unissued Italy K2 stamp

Background

K2 is on the border between China and what was in 1954 the newly independent Pakistan. At 8611 meters (28 251 ft) it is the highest point of the Karakoram Range and second highest mountain in the World.

Previous Italian expeditions in the Baltoro Muztagh Karakoram

In 1890 Roberto Lerco entered the Baltoro Muztagh region of the Karakoram. He reached the foot of K2 and may even have climbed a short way up its south-east spur, but he did not leave any account of his journey.

In 1909 the Duke of the Abruzzi expedition again explored various routes before reaching 6250 metres (20 510 ft) on the south-east ridge before deciding the mountain was unclimbable. The route became known as the Abruzzi Ridge or Abruzzi Spur, and eventually became recognised as the normal route to the summit.

On 31st July 1954, Italian climbers Achille Compagnoni and Lino Lacedelli became the first people to reach the summit of K2, the second highest mountain in the world after Mount Everest, which had been climbed for the first time the previous year. The expedition was led by Count Ardito Desio.

In 1955 it was planned to issue a set of two stamps dedicated to the conquest of the peak K2. The proposed date of issue was 2nd June 1955, printed in photogravure by the State Polygraphic Institute, Rome, imperforate, on unwatermarked paper, designed by Renato Mura, who designed the Gronchi Rosa issue of 3rd April 1961, amongst six other Italian stamps between 1955 and 1961. Although the issue was authorised with a directive from the President of the Italian Republic; No 585 of the 2nd June 1955, published in the Official Gazette no 172 of July 1955, it was never issued.

Pakistan celebrated the conquest by issuing a 2 annas commemorative stamp

on the 25th December 1955. It was printed by the Pakistan Security Printing Corporation Ltd and issued on unwatermarked paper.

There are three known types of printed proof:

- 1.Two colour photogravure colour tests (green and red) printed on imperforate sheets
- 2.Two photogravure printing tests in green
- 3. Imperforate ungummed sheets of 40 stamps with multiple stars watermark type I.

finally sold for £375.


Why can't I find these items?



HM Hospital Ship No 67 "Gerusalemme" 1944.

For many years this worn-looking cover (alongside) had languished in my pending tray having been purchased for 5p from a dealer's Bargain Box. Not being familiar with Hospital Ship 67 I contacted Peter High, our leading authority on Hospital Ship Mail, for his help in finding the background to this cover and learnt of the ship's history.







When Italy declared war in 1940 the Italian Cruise Ship *SS Gerusalemme* (left) and the *SS Timavo* tried to flee the Allied Forces. The *Timavo* grounded herself north of St Lucia Bay on the Indian Ocean coast of South Africa, between Durban and the Mozambique border, and the crew were captured but the *Gerusalemme* escaped and managed to reach Lourenço Marques (now Maputo), a neutral port in Mozambique, where she was interned. In 1943 Italy surrendered to the Allies whereupon the *Gerusalemme* was seized by the British and sent to Durban to be converted to an Allied Forces Hospital Ship to be named HMHS 67 (right) and manned by the Royal Navy and Union Castle

Having written up the cover for display I then came across a cover addressed to an Italian sailor on board the Gerusalemme when she was interned in Lourenço Margues (above). It was in an assortment of POW Mail purchased from the John Daynes Estate, and was, to say the least, unexpected. The sender was an internee in the Koffiefontein Camp in the Free State Province of South Africa which housed some 2000 Italian and German Internees and Prisoners of War. and around 800 South Africans who were thought to be pro-Nazi.. The cover bears the Camp and Passed by Censor Handstamps undated but it must have been have been in the period 1940-43.

(Could the sender have been a crew member from the Timavo? - editor)

After the war the Gerusalemme sailed to Japan and Hong Kong's Stanley Internment Camp to bring back POWs and Internees. Finally she sailed to Indochina to bring French refugees back to Toulon. On the 25th October 1946 the Gerusalemme was handed over to the Indian Navy at Madras and was subsequently scrapped in 1952. Keith Lillvwhite

The Case of the Lost Covers

It is around 20 years since I managed my last Midpex as Honorary Secretary. After the event a plain dealer-quality plastic envelope was handed in containing a small selection of early Indian used covers - some in what look like formal dealer-described individual plastic covers. At the time such a loss would have been considerable and I would expect the claimant to say something clearly identifying at least one. Or two. No such claim has ever materialized despite a mention in an ensuing Midpex circular. I also believe at the time, in our Committee winding-up analysis, I was advised that if no-one claimed them I should sell them and donate the proceeds to charity. I still have them and have wondered what to do. A would-be claimant need just, from what must have been an immediate and painful memory, identify some of the particular items. Maybe one last mention in an ABPS News is their last chance to find their rightful home. The display also included postage dues, overprints and stamps with postmarks from the various provinces. In May **David Rolls** showed his

material of *Early Peru*. After a short history, he mainly concentrated on the 19th century. The first definitives were issued in 1858 followed by early embossed issues. We saw issues for War in the Pacific, Chilean Occupation of Lima and the Peruvian Government in Exile. There were many forgeries which David displayed. His display of postcards included the Central Railway in Peru from the coast at 0 feet above sea level to 15 000 feet in the Andes mountains. In June we welcomed **Peter Pugh**, accompanied by his wife Rosemary. He showed *Hong Kong Railway Extension*,

concentrating on Hong Kong Mail carried on the Trans-Siberian Railway, mainly mail sent from 1910 to 1912. There were many destinations in the UK; Sardinia, Rome, Germany, Milan, Denmark in Europe; and Boston in the United States by boat from Liverpool after the rail journeys. Some of the rail trips involved changes of gauges on the railways. For each item of mail Peter showed a picture of the boat or train used for the journey.

This vast area was originally administered from a postal point of view from the Falkland Islands Post Office in South Georgia. Frinton & District

In June our members were treated to two members' displays. **Dave Pugh** took us back to the days of the British Empire, under Queen Victoria, to the early stamp issues of Ceylon. The first stamp was a 6d Purple issued in 1857. Why

iust one value was issued was unclear. It was totally inadequate. Other values soon followed with different colours, shades, perforation and watermark variations. Dave also showed a variety of postmarks from towns and villages in Ceylon. Between 1885 and 1908 a well-known photographer, William Cave, overprinted Ceylon stamps with his name 'CAVE', later shown in Perfins. This was totally illegal but Mr Cave got away with it and they are very much sought after by collectors. Altogether an excellent display showing the great designs of the Victorian and Edwardian era, compared to modern stamp issues. Then George Oliver showed rarer issues of France over the past 120 years. His first stamps were Postage Dues of the late 1800s. These are difficult to acquire. Other stamps had been overprinted for use by the French Army, also some beautiful stamps issued purely for use on Air Mail covers. Other regular stamps had been pre-cancelled by the Post Office and supplied to private firms. Further rare issues were for use by the French Foreign Legion and Red Cross. The beauty of stamp collecting is that collectors learn so much from the stamp designs as regards geography, politics, natural resources and history of the countries concerned. Mick Carter

Halifax

Zoom meetings continue with guests from other societies and countries. Max **Smith** entertained with a display built around a book *From India to England by* Air July 1929 written by Harriet J M Camac, re-discovered by Max within his library. It started by boat from Bombay to Karachi, transferring to a scheduled flight (City of Delhi). Scheduled flights carried mail and Max had a cover that had been carried on the second flight which had carried the author, with an arrival strike dated 7 AUG. Max identified a delay due to heavy rain, referred to during the journey by the author resulting in a flight to Alexandria with no overnight stop in an attempt to reduce the delay which could result in a fine for the late arrival of mail. We learnt that the pilot of the author's outward flight (Captain Woodbridge) later died in an aircraft accident. Paul Allen introduced us to the Postal Rates. operating from India to France, with both pre-paid and pay-on-delivery items shown. Pre-payment could not be used prior to 1856 on this route. We were introduced to the different currency and weight descriptions, changes in routes used, various rates applied to mail passing through France and the collection of charges. Stephen Parkin outlined the Operation of the East Coast Line TPO and its development as railway improvements occurred and the mail being carried grew. We saw maps, documents, photographs of railway carriages and examples of carried mail. Adrian Lee

The Winter Relief Programme was an annual donation drive by the National Socialist People's Welfare to help finance charitable work, initially set up to support German people during the Great Depression. The collection of stamps, booklets and postal stationery was well supported with publicity posters, vouchers and documents from the I930s to 1943. The AGM was held on 24th May, attended by 16 members and one visitor. After the formal business, new member Chris Grimshaw gave an excellent Postal History Display of the Dardanelles and Gallipoli Campaigns. Mick Rose followed by showing a few sheets of the late Roger Holmes's collection, which was sold off at the end of From H&DPS Bulletin the meeting.

Huddersfield

In April Douglas Armitage outlined the Recent and Postal History of Zimbabwe particularly a period of hyper-inflation from 1980 to 2009. He showed mail in and out of Zimbabwe with a variety of commercial postal services, some resulting in underpaid dues being charged internationally. During this period, inflation rates rose from 48% p.a. to the accelerated rise from 1.2 million% to 231 million% in 2008. The values printed on adhesive stamps were shown resulting in the use of non-value indicator stamps for different mail services. Mike Roberts explained why Pakistan Surcharges 1961 occurred with overprinting of their stamps due to the currency change on 1st January 1961 for which the postal authorities

appeared unprepared. Some of the surcharges were locally produced and remained valid for use. The number of varieties of overprint resulted in forgeries. In May president **Peter Clemenson** brought us *Airships*. He explained the construction of different airships, the various gases used to provide lift and their use in WWI. We saw photographs of airships and items of mail which showed their use around the world. The Zeppelin became known for their use when modified as bombers during WWI for attacks on Great Britain. In June in a departure from normal meetings, guest members of Holmfirth and Longwood Harriers attended to view **Mike Pennington**'s display of *GB 2012 Olympics* stamp issues together with ephemera from the event. Mike gave the display in the uniform provided to helpers at the events - very smart.

Hull Stamp and Postcard

The April meeting was a PowerPoint display of Hull postcards given by Robert **McMillan.** We saw how areas of the city had changed over the period 1904 to 1930, particularly in the city centre and the pier area, as well as the docks and municipal parks. We also saw how fashions changed from the Edwardian era onwards. In May John Sussex RDP treated us to a display of Modern British Postal History. Some of the often short-lived rates shown, notably to obscure destinations in Africa, are particularly difficult to find. This is a neglected area of collecting, often dismissed by collectors because it is so recent. John's collection is considered to be currently the most comprehensive of its kind and would be extremely difficult to replicate. Edith and Rodney Knight gave us a Spanish Miscellany in June, showing material ranging from postal stationery and postcards of Spanish Guinea, through 1850s postal history, railways and maritime mail. There was also some more modern tourist material, contrasting sharply with the examples of UPU specimens, in strips of three, from the Madagascar archives and some interesting advertising envelopes. → Robert McMillan, robertfmcmillan@gmail.com or www.hullphilatelicsociety.com Daphne McMillan

At our Members' Evening in May the subject was *The Letters E, D and F*. On 1st February 1854 The Phillippines was the first Asian country to issue postage stamps countrywide. Nigel led with the eleven issues of Queen Isabella II (1833 -1868), and some of their forgeries. Between 1868 and 1874 a

Revolutionary Committee governed Spain and its colonies, and determined that the remaining stamps from the 1864 issue should be overprinted "HABILITADO DO POR LA NACION" [Validated by the New Government]. The speedy surcharges resulted in many varieties of hand-stamping dies. After diplomatic negotiations, Amedeo, Duke of Aosta, was selected to rule as King Amadeo (1870 – 1873) but he resigned on 11th February 1873. Holiday Destinations was our final theme. Chris Oliver suggested Kruger National Park or Swanage and Corfe Castle on the Isle of Purbeck in Dorset. Our president, Susan Oliver showed postal history from York. Roger Niven showed late 1800 / early 1900's PPCs of French seaside destinations. Finally Brian Sole brought Slogan Postmarks from seaside resorts and Railway labels to stations served from Waterloo.



Derek Earnshaw gave a talk on *The 1793 introduction of the Uniform Penny Post in and around Manchester*. Over 50 examples of penny post letters were shown from the 36 postal offices in the area. In 1837 because of over-charging, a court case established that Post Masters must legally charge no more than a penny for local post. Postage for letters addressed to locations outside the

Manchester area continued to cost considerably more. To send a letter you had to take it to the local Post Master's office who charged the postage rate payable. Later the system changed so that instead, the recipient had to pay the postage when picking up the letter from the local Post Master. The club's annual competition was held with 9 members each presenting 9 sheets. The topics were Maltese stamps issued in 1992, British postmarks from 1844 to 1880, Postmarks from Lancashire and Cheshire, British Open Golf Championship, Overprinted New Zealand 2½ cent stamps, Events from WWI, Japanese issues to encourage young stamp collectors, Memorabilia of the wedding of Prince Charles and Princess Diana and British Forces stamps from Egyptian postal concessions on letter postal rates. 

Book Reviews



Catalog of Postal Stationery Airgraphs:

Published in 2020 by The United Postal Stationery Society, Inc, 75 pages, soft cover 8½ in x 11in Available on *www.upss.org* under publications, where payment can be made with PayPal or credit card (processed through PayPal, no PayPal account needed), or by sending a cheque to: UPSS Publications Office, P.O. This catalog covers postal stationery airgraphs of the United Kingdom East Africa Command, Ceylon, Egypt, India, Palestine, South Africa and Southern

Rhodesia. An essential wartime service need of Great Britain in WWII was to enable troops in its far-flung empire to send and receive mail from home via airmail rather than by sea. This could not be done during the first years of the war due to the small number of airplanes available and the extremely limited cargo capacity of those aircraft. Sending by sea took many weeks or months, and the danger of losing mail due to attack by German or Italian submarine was high. If mail were to be lost, morale of both the troops and their families back home would greatly suffer. Airmail letters, even aerograms that were soon introduced to obviate the need for an envelope, did not weigh much per item, but the number needed per month was hundreds of thousands, resulting in mail cargo initially weighing more than a dozen tons weekly. The widely used Short Brothers "Empire" flying boats, extensively used to the East, had a 2.2-ton cargo capacity plus 17 passengers, with a 1500-mile range.

The novel solution was the Airgraph service. Letters were written on standardized forms, microfilmed at or near the source, then flown to special development centers where the microfilm was developed into prints. These were inserted into window envelopes and mailed to destination. The Airgraph forms were designed so the address information was in a box located such that it would be positioned on the airgraph photo that, when inserted into the envelope, would appear in the window.

The number of British Airgraphs used in WWII was 313 745 182, and that amount of microfilm weighed 31.7 tons. If, instead, that correspondence had


been lightweight aerograms, the air cargo weight would have been about 1400 tons, and if it had been letter paper with light-weight envelopes, 3000 tons.

Each Airgraph message to be microfilmed was required to be on a special form so that the whole process could be automated to a large degree. The forms were usually printed locally by private or government printers. The result is that there are many hundreds of different types known to collectors. Virtually all were formular (including all USA V-Mail forms), and given out free. These Airgraph forms required the application of an adhesive stamp (though the American V-Mail service was free). The adhesive stamp was placed on the back, and thus not microfilmed, and not visible on the developed Airgraph mailed to the addressee.

Eight countries issued some or all of their Airgraph forms prepaid. Two affixed adhesive stamps before selling the forms, so they were prepaid Airgraphs forms, while the other five sold them with indicia imprinted or implied. These are postal stationery, and the exclusive subject of this catalog.

The catalog shows all the different types of airgraphs in colour, as well as many photos showing the photographing and processing operations. The catalog is well done and will be essential to any collector interested in WWII airgraphs.

THE AIRMAIL SOCIETY OF NEW ZEALAND

Airmails of New Zealand - The Inland Flights - An Aerophilatelic History

One of the main objectives of the Airmail Society of NZ is to record the airmail history of New Zealand as a handy reference for collectors and for future generations. The initial publication of the handbook The Air Mails and Pigeon Posts of New Zealand, compiled and edited by Ray Collins, was in 1931. In 1955 the Airmails of New Zealand Volume One: The Internal Flights was published, largely through the efforts of Douglas Walker. Then, in 1986 the society's third publication appeared: the Airmails of New Zealand, Volume Two: Overseas Flights 1928-1940 by Douglas Walker. This was supplemented in 1997 with Robin Startup's *Airmails* of New Zealand, Volume Three: International Airmails 1940-1970.

In 2000 the society decided Volume One, The Internal Flights (which described the airmails in chronological order, from the 1897 pigeongram mails through to the latest domestic airline services at the time) needed to be brought up to date, the older text revised, and illustrations, not possible all those years ago, to be included. Appreciating that a revised handbook required a large amount of work, the go-ahead for research was given.

Jim Stapleton produced the typescript of a fascinating story of New Zealand's inland airmails in 1994, an extensive look at the flights and services behind flown covers, arranged by airlines. From this typescript came the manuscript entitled *The Inland Flights - An Aerophilatelic History*, covering the background to the development of aviation for the carriage of mails in New Zealand.

The book has been jointly published by the Airmail Society and Mowbray Collectables. At 150 pages, it includes 18 chapters on airlines ranging from the Walsh Brothers 1919-1922 through Cook Strait Airways and Mount Cook Airlines in the 1930s to 1970s, to NAC and Air New Zealand to 1994. Each chapter focuses on the services provided, and much effort has gone into obtaining colour scans of the original illustrations which were all monocolour. There are also substantial chapters on special event airmails to 1994, and a checklist of events and flights, as well as an index and bibliography. The monograph is 150 pages, perfect bound, with many excellent illustrations, most in full colour, and is very readable.

As the foreword notes, major contributors to the publication of this monograph other than Jim Stapleton, include Robin Startup, RDP FRSPL FRPSNZ who spent many hours on detailed editing work, Mike Shand, Keith Griffiths, Alan Tunnicliffe, Bill Mitchell and many other fellow collectors, plus David Smitham who brought the manuscript to publication stage. Mowbray Collectables agreed to arrange for the printing and publishing of the new book, and it should grace the shelves of those interested in aerophilately for many years to come.
