

MESSAGE FROM THE CHAIR:

In the last edition of ABPS News I was reflecting on the "Stamp Swap Out Scheme" that Royal Mail had in operation. Since then of course we have moved on and now we have the new stamps of King Charles III. The image of HM The King is an adapted version of the portrait created by Martin Jennings for the obverse of the new Royal Mint coinage and shows the new monarch facing to the left. So out have gone the Machins, now we have the Jennings! Will we see Machin collectors



becoming Jennings collectors? I'd be very interested to know what you think about the new stamps.

If you are one of the many collectors who participate in competitive philately, I think you will be interested to know about some proposed developments in this area. Next year, UK Exhibitions are trying something new. It is no longer practical to hold UK exhibitions as part of Stampex, so there will be no exhibition as part of Autumn Stampex from 27th-30th September 2023. Instead, the Royal Philatelic Society London will become the new home of UK qualifying exhibitions in London. It is also intended to continue running exhibitions as part of the York Stamp Fair, which, this summer, will take place from 21st-22nd July, and there may be other regional events.

The first exhibition at the Royal will be from Thursday 28th March to Saturday 30th March 2024. Providing it is successful, the intention is to have two exhibitions a year at the Royal from then on. These events will be open to anyone, not just Royal members, whether as an exhibitor or visitor. There is no admission charge to attend and the standard UK frame fees of £25 per frame will apply. All FIP classes will be welcome, including literature, plus the UK classes of Ephemera and Cinderellas. Judged exhibits will receive certificates and medals, and those receiving 75 marks or above will be qualified for international exhibitions.

Going back to the topic of local philatelic societies, in my last Chair's Update I suggested that there were some really good, innovative ideas out there that were being put into operation and really helping local societies to flourish. Do let me, or Keith Burton, know about what you are doing at your local society to make sure it continues to prosper!

I heard recently that philately is very strong and alive in China. In fact, some factories have their own philatelic society for the workers to join. At one factory alone the philatelic society has 2750 members!

I always like to stress the importance of communication. Without good communication who knows what's going on or what the current issues are in philately that need addressing? Zoom meetings covering the sessions are available so you have a chance to try before you commit yourself to the 2024 Congress. There might even be time to fit in a visit to this one if you are reading the digital version - see the ABPS website's Congress page for more details.

In July the York Stamp (and Coin) Fair will take place at the Racecourse. Barring accidents I will be there on both days and would love to meet old and new friends. There is a National Competition on display, instead of at the Autumn Stampex. I hope that there will be lots of exhibits for us to see - it is a great opportunity for those from the northern part of the kingdom to meet, see others' work and to try to find and add one or more of those elusive items to their collection. I can't remember when I came away empty-handed.

Our hobby has to develop and embrace new ideas if we are to thrive. Grantham Stamp Club - 50 Years



This year marked the 50th Anniversary of the Grantham Stamp Club. Those who made it to the event, as seen in the rogues' gallery photo, enjoyed a buffet night and a display from **Peter Wain** of the Lincoln Stamp Club on *Rubbish*, his second display to us of his Postal History collection from closed Post Offices from around the UK. It was a super display. The evening was marred only by the fact that one of our oldest and the last co-founding member of the club from 1973, **Wilf Potterton**, a retired Grantham Police Sergeant, passed away in December before he saw the anniversary. We meet on the first Wednesday of each month at Gonerby Memorial Hall at 19.00 hrs, with competitions, regular displays by members and visiting speakers on stamps, philatelic and postal material.

Great Britain Overprints Society - 50 Years

After three failed attempts due to Covid and rail strikes, we celebrated our 50thAniversary and presented a display at The Royal Philatelic Society on 2nd February 2023. Thirty-seven of our members presented a variety of stamps and postal history on forty-four frames. which were viewed by over 100 members and guests of the Royal and the GBOS. Material included overprints from Cyprus, Bechuanaland, Niger Coast Protectorate, Oil Rivers Protectorate, Morocco Agencies from the Queen Victoria era to 1957, Eastern Arabia and the

An experiment with the QR Code stamps



Congress Medal of 2023



The ABPS has awarded the Congress Medal 2023 to David Alford FRPSL.

Whenever ABPS organises a National or International Exhibition David is an integral part of the team. He started as a national judge in 2007 and is currently ABPS Jury Secretary. He was Office Manager for the competition side of EuroPhilEx 2015, Chief Operating Officer for London 2022 and is currently part of the organising team for EuroPhilEx 2025.

Before the current ABPS website was established he designed and managed its predecessor.

At specialist level he was the Publications Officer for the Pacific Islands Study Circle 1991-2020 and at the same time between 2006 to 2009 was editor of the National Philatelic Society's journal 'Stamp Lover'.

At Federation level he designed the website of the Mid Anglia Philatelic Federation which he managed from 2014 to 2020.

The Royal Philatelic Society has benefitted from his expertise in publishing as he is a member of the Publications Committee. In addition, he is a committee member of the Members and Representatives Committee. His service as a council member commenced in 2008 and continues to this day.

A trustee of the Stuart Rossiter Trust from 2013 to date and he supports his local society North Herts Stamp Club.

David Alford is one of philately's unsung heroes having provided unrivalled service at all levels of organised philately. He is a worthy recipient of the Congress Medal.

ABPS Finances

The ABPS accounts for the year ended 31st December 2022 have now been published on our website and show that, despite falling affiliation fees, a breakeven position has been achieved.

This position is in no small part due to the surplus achieved by ABPS Exhibitions Ltd from the administration charges it makes to entrants for assisting them to compete in international exhibitions including London 2022.

The major increases in expenditure are our affiliations to the two international bodies in organised philately together with our delegates' travelling expenses to the annual meetings of those groups where our attendance ensures the UK's voice is heard.

The other large increase is in our insurance premiums which have risen in a hardening market and for which a more competitive quote could not be obtained.

The Association's financial support for Stampex was reduced from £11 000 to £5944, as indicated in the fall in expenditure on grants, due to reduced funds being available. Without available financial resources meaningful support for Europhilex Birmingham 2025 will be difficult although the recent increase in affiliation fees may enable this project to be properly supported.

The Roll of Distinguished Philatelists

Signing ceremony during IBRA 2023. An invitation for everyone to attend.

The Roll of Distinguished Philatelists is the highest and most prestigious of honours in philately, and is the world's oldest philatelic honour. It recognises achievement, research, publication and service in many areas of philately. The Roll was instituted in Harrogate, England in May 1921 and the signature of His Majesty King George V appears at its head as the first signatory. The total number of signatories up to and



including those selected in 2023 (but excluding HM King George V) is 407 from 41 different countries. In its design, it contains the names of 44 so-called "Fathers of Philately", names of great philatelists who would have been invited to

sign had they been alive at the time. At the first ceremony in Harrogate the signatures of the initial 39 names were added to the Roll.

This year's signing ceremony, on the occasion of the 102nd anniversary of the first signatories to the Roll, will take place from 5pm on Friday 26th May 2022 at Schlosshotel Hugenpoet, Essen, Germany, during the IBRA 2023 International Philatelic Exhibition. The 2023 signatories will be accompanied by two elected during the last two years who had not yet been able to sign because of the pandemic. The ceremony is followed by a free drinks reception. Attendance at the ceremony is open to all, there is no need to pre-book and attendees should gather for the ceremony from 5pm. Return buses to the ceremony will be provided free, leaving from the Hotel Bredeney at 4pm and 4.15pm, and from Messe Essen where the exhibition is being held at 4.15pm and 4.30pm.

The new signatories join 89 other current living RDPs from 27 countries spread over six continents. The new RDPs:



1. Pradip Jain RDP of India has focussed on various aspects of Indian philately. His collection of India airmails is well-known and his exhibit "Indian Airmails Development and Operations 1911-1942" has gained international awards.



2. Professor Dr. Damian Läge RDP of Switzerland is well-known for his major Thematic exhibits.







- **3. Jesús Sitjà-Prats RDP of Spain** has philatelic interests which cover not just Spain but also the Spanish Colonies of South America.
- 4. Turhan Turgut RDP of Turkey focusses his collecting interests on the postal history of the Ottoman Empire and various of these exhibits have received gold awards at numerous exhibitions from the 1990s.
- 5. Ms. Patricia "Trish" Kaufmann RDP of United States of America has been for many years the leading dealer in USA Civil War philatelic material, including the stamps and postal history of the Confederate States, with an encyclopædic knowledge of the stamp production, significance, and use.

Reg Lee - Last AEPS Founding Member Dies

Early in 1944, the idea of a county association of philatelic societies was conceived by Mr JB Seymour FRPSL, an Essex philatelist of world-wide renown. This idea was discussed at length at Leytonstone Library at a "Congress" hosted on 3rd June by the Leytonstone society with the representatives of the Colchester, Forest, Ilford and Southend-on-Sea societies. Although the inaugural meeting under the AEPS name was not held until 1945, 3rd June 1944 was the day the decision was taken to found the "Association of Essex Philatelic Societies" (AEPS), with these five founder member societies. Three days later, the war took a major turn towards its end, with the Allied "D-Day" invasion of the European continent, starting in Normandy.

The AEPS claims to be the first single-county federation to be formed in Britain. Present at that meeting in 1944 was **Reg Lee**, a member of the Leytonstone Philatelic Society (later Leytonstone, Wanstead & District PS), who was elected publicity officer of the new association, a post he held until 1946. From 1948 to 1950, he was assistant secretary of the AEPS, but did not become secretary. Between 1959 and 1962, he served as vice chairman of the AEPS, then, from 1962-1965, as chairman. From 1968 to 2014, he served as archivist. In 1972, he formed part of the AEPS team that gave a display to the Royal Philatelic Society London. In all, he served the AEPS in various capacities for 58 years, a record that still stands.

He was awarded Life Membership of the Association in 1969 and received the British Philatelic Federation Award of Merit in 1989.

He died just before Christmas in 2022, and the Association's condolences are extended to his daughter, Amanda, and his wider family. Len Stanway

Phillip Harriman (1949-2023)

Sadly I report the death of Phillip Harriman on 11th February 2023. He suddenly became ill last Christmas Day, quickly being found to have a rare cancer only found when at a terminal state. Phill joined Middlesbrough & District PS in September 1980, becoming secretary in 1981, a post he held thereafter and he had also served as president. His collecting interests were predominantly GB – booklets, Machin double heads and especially Guisborough and Middlesbrough postal history. He also collected dinosaurs and was a



huge railway enthusiast. He later joined Redcar & Cleveland PS where he had also served as president. Phill was active in both the North East of England (NEPA) and Yorkshire (YPA) Philatelic Associations and was competitions secretary for both associations for many years. He was also President of NEPA in 2010-11, displaying to all affiliated societies during his term of office, and at most of these societies and others further afield throughout his philatelic life. Phill had been a chemistry teacher and was comfortable talking to anybody and everybody, willingly sharing his knowledge and supporting his societies at all times. On a personal basis, he was a great friend; we travelled together to the Middlesbrough meetings for 39 years so it is a lonely journey now. He will be greatly missed by many and remembered by many, many more. Our sincere condolences go out to all his family.

Including Buyer's Premium in the extraordinary sum of £4,788 we actually paid GBP£25,788= upon a £3,000 estimate. however, we broke it down into sets, singles, minicollections etc. We made a profit. Some might say it found its price. Others may say:

4 Understanding the problem... always remember the car trade had their own little 'bible' - Glass's Guide. I've no idea. I've not even looked - in this. internet-dominated world, it may even have disappeared. Well there's an insider Stamp Trade publication for Stamp Dealers called "The Philatelic Exporter". There's nothing that special about it - and you won't learn much or find massively reduced prices by subscribing BUT - it is a forum, a paper focal point, a last 'bastion' in this on-line transparent world that we inhabit. whereby dealers (and auctioneers) cantry and communicate with each other. I publish my own articles there...

Recently 1 discussed the outcome of my 10 years' simple research, asking dealers and auctioneers 'what is your biggest problem?'

To a man, (why are we almost all men), they replied — "my biggest problem is stock, if I can get more of the right stock I can sell it easily"

Strange that, nobody ever asked me the same question back – because my answer would have been entirely different (and I don't treat it as a problem) – I seek to satisfy more collector clients than any other stamp

This is the reason why my company has such massive advertising. This is the reason why we spend up to 8% of turnover – up to £200,000 per armum in marketing costs. (Most dealers don't even sell £200K per armum).

5 Why is that? Because, as the world revolved the Stamp Market, imperceptibly Changed, and incrementally -Massively

So, although few will tell you this, it's clearly evident that the problem for most Sellers of Stamps today is no longer absent stock — but absent collectors in the place they choose to sell their stamps in, Simply put, other Dealers, Auctions, Stamp Fairs have not invested in marketing to have a strong Customer-core. To be fair, this is not true of all - but it is true of most - so that our former competitor 'Apex' had 800 bidders in a recent auction. In my most recent 20,000+ lot UPA 77th Auction we had 1,793 different bidders from 49 different countries, 95% of whom were Collectors. Some other well-advertised auctions only have 200 bidders (a high percentage of whom are dealers - so that, essentially they are Dealer-dominated auctions) - so that when you sell through them - you're paying up to 18% (including VAT) seller's commission and the buyer is paying up to 25% and more in Buyer's Premium, credit card fees, on-line bidding fee, delivery and insurance etc ... AND all of that so that your stamps may be sold, wait for it - TO DEALERS (and some collectors), but Dealers, that naturally must make a profit to survive ...

Now, let's examine the cost implications - Example: Your stamp collection sells in public auction for £800. Upon a 25% buyer's prenyum, the dealer pays £1,000 and it could be more. He breaks it into £2,000+ selling price (much lower and he'll go out of business). The auction charges you a seller's commission of up to 18% (VAT included) upon the £800 sale price. This is GBP£144. Therefore you receive approaching £656 - which is approximately 33% of the dealer's £2,000+/- retail selling price - BUT... now that we have identified the problem...

obvious so that money may be taken, almost surreptitiously, in numerous different ways, (without us apparently noticing until we see the cheque in our pocket) - the transparent 'seller pays' has been deliberately 'obscured' so much so that, amazingly, the latest 2017 European Auction Selling Legislation just introduced - now requires auctions that charge 'buyer's premiums' to warn the buyer in advance. Just imagine going into the petrol station, and being warned that the price you're paying to put fuel in you tank is not the real price, you have to pay a premium! Obviously, there would be an uproar...

9 How can you cut out the middleman and sell to Collectors instead? Well, I can think of two ways. 1). DIY - Do It Yourself selling on eBay. That may be fine for lower grade material - but, would you risk auctioning relatively unprotected rare material on eBay. If We don't and we're professionals, so we should know what we're doing. 



A friend's search for Mary Seacole and the making of a stamp.

At the January meeting of the Launceston Stamp Club – "Members' Displays" one of the seven displays was given by **David Hatwell**. This most interesting

display related to a Jamaican lady, Mary Seacole, from the nineteenth century who had been involved with nursing in the Crimean War. David told the story of the developments and detective work carried out by author Helen Rappaport which led her to write a biography of Mary — 'In Search of Mary Seacole'. This stemmed from Helen's initial research for her book "No Place for Ladies: The Untold Story of Women in the Crimean War", published February 2007. David explained that he and his wife Lynne have been long-term friends with Helen; hence he was able to give a thorough insight into Helen's detective work into the preparation of the book, including the discovery of a portrait of Mary by Albert Charles Challen 1869, which now hangs in the National Portrait



Gallery. The portrait is one of ten 1st class stamps issued on 8th July 2006 to commemorate the 150th Anniversary of the National Portrait Gallery. *Des Kent*

The display included pictures of the town and a number of covers. It concluded with a series of love letters from a young lady who lived in a nearby village to a young man in Goslar. The mail was sent by post coaches. Most of the letters were written by the lady but fewer letters from the man. The


couple eventually married but sadly the marriage did not last for long due to the death of the man. In March **David Rennie**, a member since 1982 and currently the President of Bromley & Beckenham PS gave a display entitled *Mixed Frames*. These were named *British Stamps* including early ship letters, *New South Wales* and *Tasmania* – both showing hand-engraved stamps, *Registered Covers* from a variety of countries, *Burma Stamps from 1937* and *North Borneo issues*. including George VI and Japanese Occupation issues. *Graham Harker*

post office, but when the New Territories and some of the islands were added on a 99-year lease, there were many more post office branches and cancellations, including for example Kowloon. Spence showed various early postcards with views of Hong Kong and the islands. He continued through the years to the Christmas Day 1941 fall of Hong Kong to the Japanese. *Paul Barry*

Every December we hold our annual Kirk Hillard Cup competition for best display of nine sheets. **Kirk Hillard** was one of our founding members. The cup celebrates this. The winner was **Wojciech Kierstan** with his display on *Polish WWII POW Camp Posts*. During WWII four Oflags (Offizerlagers) occupied by Polish officers, and situated in Germany, operated postal services within their camps on similar lines to a normal post office, printing their own stamps and employing their own postman. The display was of a selection of the stamps and postcards that were produced in the four camps - OFLAG II C – Woldenberg, OFLAG II D – Grossborn, OFLAG II E – Neubrandenburg, OFLAG VII A – Murnau. It was an excellent display. **Mark Ellis** produced a display on *Trams and the Postage Stamp* showing trams, horse-drawn, steam, cable-drawn and battery-powered to electric doubledeckers on both stamps and booklets. **Michael Ellison** showed *Modern Architecture* with stamps from Hungary, France, Austria, Germany, the USA and the UK depicting some great buildings.

In February we enjoyed a display by **Mike Roberts** of a collection of covers, trade and manufacturing documents with banking and newspaper printed paper rates and other items of postal history related to the *City of Liverpool*. The documents featured steel-plate-print headed letterheads, invoices etc - examples of the printers' art, all of which were of widely differing dimensions testing the ingenuity of the methods used to present an attractive display. **Max Smith** provided a display of the *1935 Quetta Earthquake* which occurred on 31st May between 2.33am and 3.40am. March meeting speaker **Graham Winters**

from Wakefield PS presented a series of current competition classes with examples of each of six categories. including *Maxiphilately, Modern Philately* which comprised double-size sheets containing GB covers with examples of special services provided by Royal Mail, noting that registered mail passing through Leeds had a distinctive yellow sticker, *Ephemera* and *Astrophilately*. **Maria Fabrizi** gave The President's Display based on a quantity of personal information contained in suitcases obtained from the family of a deceased man (*Jacob Amler*) who was born in an area of former Germany subjected to national boundary changes brought about during various conflicts from his birth in 1906. The documents included some for re-registration by occupying forces, Russian, Polish and later UN and finally UK, where he was identified as a former German. It included mail items received including 1960s and his employment in the gas industry until retirement in 1971.

Harrogate

Our first Zoom was a trip to Asia. As usual the range was wide including China to Spain, Airmails to Indo-China, Asia in 50 AD, Singapore in 2022 and the Japanese Midget Submarine attack on Sydney Harbour. In February Peter Chadwick took us to East Prussia and East Silesia. We were treated to a fascinating history of these areas - from Napoleonic times, (including letters from his disastrous Russian campaign) through the post-WWI upheavals to our current era and the Russian occupation of Kaliningrad in East Prussia. David Belton was the guest speaker on 28th February when he displayed *The* Isle of Man. He started off by showing an engraving of the Isle of Man. He then went on to various hand-stamped mail from the 1800s pre-stamp period and the Victorian stamp period with the covers stamped with a penny red. Examples of registered mail followed and Military mail which came from the WWII internment camps with the Opened by Examiner Label attached. When St Marks sub-post office closed on 30th June a commemorative cover was issued and we were shown an example. David finished the first half with a souvenir cover issued by the Castletown philatelic society in 1977. The second half concentrated on the regional stamps. He displayed rough sketches of ideas for the first issue of 1958, then a guarter sheet of the 3d deep lilac with a flaw. The next stamps were issued on 5th July 1973 (Independence Day) and full sheets and booklet panes were shown along with postage due labels. Berrisford a huge task successfully completed, with the winners announced at the end of the meeting. During the evening members were entertained by an ephemera display entitled: One Man and his Windmill. It illustrated the life of William Carr, Manager, Gayton Tower Mill. Dahlia Harrison

We have enjoyed Zoom meetings with either multiple displayers or a single speaker. We had a members' evening showing Hobbies on Stamp. Naturally it led to a wide interpretation – what else can you expect from such an opportunity? Michael Furfie went to an auction, but was disappointed by the lack of suitable postage due stamps, his main interest. He spotted a collection of Nepal which has formed the basis of his collection and this display. Michael aided his display by distributing a map showing the main settlements and routes between them and a page showing the depiction of the various postmarks. Postage stamps were printed on a rough, locally-produced, paper made from an acid-free shrub. These stamps of 1881 would have only been used internally. More stamps, depicting Shiva, were produced in Britain by Perkins, Bacon from 1907 to 1935. Cancellation was by a series of horizontal bars with a central figure within an oval. Michael had certainly used his analytical mind to show us an exceptionally good display of Nepal, a country not often displayed. For the President's Display Susan Oliver departed from showing her beloved Faeroe Islands and displayed part of her extensive collection of North Yorkshire Postal History. The first half concentrated on Whitby, with a view of the resort of Scarborough in the second part. We saw several straight-line cancellations of Whitby and 18th century cancellations of Scarborough which were very varied.

In January we viewed a most informative display about the *Island of Zanzibar*. **Derek Wiltshire**, member, with stamps, covers, postmarks, postal stationery and historic postcards, told of the complex postal and physical history of this island which is now part of Tanzania. How important it is to read other local groups' articles in this magazine! Over the past year we have found a wealth of new visiting speakers from this magazine and the ABPS online directory. Our January meeting opened with a one-minute silence for the death of our friend and member David Glassbrook. At our February meeting, Jack Lindley, our New Zealand specialist, presented Queen Elizabeth Stamps from 1954. The first definitives issued had very small denomination figures. Complaints followed resulting in the complete issue being replaced with larger figures. Jack displayed examples of errors from sheets. coils and booklets, complicated by colour and paper variations. Queen Elizabeth was first portraved in 1943 on triangular health stamps and in 1951 with Prince Charles. Jack ended with many New Zealand first day covers, always popular, judging by the trade prices. Peter Best presented stamps and covers from Malta, which he visits regularly. Early British stamps were issued in Malta apart from the 2s 6d value. Material displayed concentrated on postmark variations. From 1900 to 1921 post offices were relocated into the local police stations. In April members displayed from their collections opening with 18th century covers and letters of various shapes and sizes and all posted from Bury. These were followed by Malta maxi cards mainly from stamp exhibitions held around the capitals of Europe. Many cards highlighted Maltese transport by road, rail, sea and air. A collection of Recently Issued Stamps from New Zealand followed on subjects such as anniversaries, centennials, travel, and wildlife. Next something different, which discussed stamps related to the Mysteries of Crystal Skulls, The Loch Ness Monster and An Explanation of the Nature of Time. 



A 172-year-old Mystery Solved!

Iconic classic stamps are often surrounded by an air of mystery, sometimes based on fact, often on fantasy. The Spanish 1851 2 Reales error of colour is certainly iconic, as to date only three examples have been recorded. At first, the stamp, printed in blue instead of the normal brick-red, was deemed to be either an essay or a colour proof. Other early philatelists believed it to be an error (later proven by the discovery of another example in a pair with a 6 reales – the correct value issued in blue) but none could explain how this had come about.

Now, 172 years later, a Spanish philatelist and researcher, has discovered official documents in the Provincial Archive in Zaragoza, Spain, that reveal not only the contemporary official correspondence relating to the discovery of the printer's mistaken inclusion of the wrong value and the recall of the stamps concerned, but also the error's exact position on the sheet.

José Antonio Herralz reveals the results of his research for the first time in English, in the March edition of THE LONDON PHILATELIST, the journal of the Royal Philatelic Society London

Richard Scott Morel, Curator, British Library Philatelic Collections—which includes one of the three known examples of the error in the Tapling Collection—commented:

"This amazing discovery provides important new insight into one of Spain's most significant philatelic rarities and amply demonstrates the value of archival holdings for original research. Well done Señor Herraiz, what an absolutely amazing find!"

It is some time since I have commented on the latest in British stamps. Rarely seeing anything of the commemoratives on my quite substantial mail, and





AUSTRALASIAN CRASH MAIL AND MAIL FROM OTHER INCIDENTS, VOLUME FIVE 1950 TO 2005

Australasian Crash Mail and Mail from Other Incidents Volume Five: 1950-2005

This hard cover 300-page book covers all crashes and incidents with an Australian, New Zealand or Papua New Guinea connection where mail was involved; but it is much more than that. The author has been thorough in setting a context; not simply explaining the distinction between an accident and an incident.

The book is effectively a comprehensive demonstration of the challenges and hazards facing pilots and the growing airline industry in the post-war years, from a social and historical, as well as a philatelic, perspective.

The tables at the end of each of the first four chapters are useful in that it is a relatively simple task to check air mail covers to establish if they could have been involved in an accident or incident.

The inclusion in tables of the amount of mail carried, and the recorded or estimated numbers of surviving covers, will be invaluable for auction houses and dealers as well as collectors. Whilst some would prefer to see values, auction realisations or scarcity ratings included, the author has deliberately avoided their inclusion.

A detailed census has been prepared for all accidents where more than four examples are recorded. It must be stressed that each of these is a **preliminary** census and must be treated as a work in progress. Where four or fewer examples are recorded, they are described and illustrated in the text.

Chapter 2 - New Zealand internal airmails - is larger than in previous volumes.

Chapter 3 also includes many flights to and from New Zealand including the 1979 Air New Zealand crash on Mount Erebus in Antarctica.

Chapter 4 covers two hijacks of aircraft carrying mail to Australasia. Chapters 5, 7 and 8 include updated censuses from previous volumes.

The extensive list of references points to this study being not only thorough, wide-ranging. The possibility of new crash covers emerging is an incentive for aerophilatelists, and dealers, to re-examine their air mail covers from this period.

At 285 + xiv pages, the book is the culmination of decades of research and writings. The author first wrote on the subject 50 years ago, and is the acknowledged authority on the subject. It may be that the readership will turn out to be wider than auctioneers, aerophilatelists and dealers.

The book has been well researched and will be essential to anyone interested in airmail of Australia, New Zealand or Papua New Guinea.
